Japan Will Want a Buffer State
Between China and Korea.

A War on France's Hands—Natives of
Madagascar Refuse the Ambassa-
dor's Demands.

In Memory of the Late Czar.
LONDON, Nov. 6.—Services were held this forenoon in the Russian chapel for the repose of the soul of the late Czar. Among those present were Lord Rosebery, Lord Kimberley, the Duke of Cambridge, the Duke of York and many other members of nobility.

LONDON, Nov. 6.—Labouchere's Truth says the Queen is arranging for a funeral service at Windsor on the day of the Czar's funeral in St. Petersburg. She will return to Windsor next week.

The Hovas Will Fight.

LONDON, Nov. 6.—A private dispatch from Madagascar received in London this morning states that the Hova Government intends to make a most stubborn resistance to any attempt by France to force her demands.

PORT LOUIS, Mauritius, Nov. 6.—Advices from Tamatave, of date Nov. 3, are to the effect that the Government of Madagascar has refused to grant the French demands. M. Le Myre de Villiers, the French special envoy, and all the French residents of Antananarivo, arrived at Tamatave on Nov. 2. The warship Higon has gone along the coast to pick up refugees. All the British residents of the capital remain, the Government promising them full protection.

Relations of Britain and France.

PARIS, Nov. 6.—The Matin publishes an article by Sir Charles Dilke on the relations between Great Britain and France, in which the writer asserts that the difficulty existing between the two nations with regard to Newfoundland faces England rather than France, but has not at present reached an acute stage. Sir Charles Dilke expresses regret over the warlike attitude assumed by the French Government toward Madagascar, which, he says, will work injury to the most valuable experiment ever made in native government by Christian people under the auspices of French, English and American teachers. France, Sir Charles believes, could have obtained by pacific means all to which she was entitled.

Franco-Canadian Treaty Indorsed.

PARIS, Nov. 6.—The customs committee of the Chamber of Deputies today discussed the bill providing for a commercial agreement between France and the Dominion of Canada.

M. Chevalier opposed any concession in the duties imposed on apples and wood. M. Berger said that these articles were largely exported to St. Pierre Miquelon. France, he said, granted the minimum rate of duty on twenty articles against the benefits of the most favored nation clause in the proposed convention.

After a thorough discussion of the matter a vote was taken, resulting in the approval of the agreement.

China Cries "Enough!"

LONDON, Nov. 6.—The Foreign Office in response to inquiries confirms the report that the Chinese Government has requested the powers having commercial interests at stake to intervene for the purpose of securing a settlement of the war with Japan.

The Exchange Telegraph Company is authorized to deny the statement of Reuters' Telegram Company, printed in the St. James' Gazette that the British Government had sent an ultimatum to the Viceroy of Peking Chi Li demanding a settlement of the Chun King affair. No ultimatum, the Exchange Telegraph Company says, is required, as the Chinese Government has tendered an apology for the outrage and has agreed to pay the indemnity demanded, and that the Chun King shall be saluted by the forts.

A dispatch from Kobe says the first Japanese army has reached a port above Talian Wan and established communication with the second army.

The Times' correspondent at Yokohama says that before the capture of Wong Hong Tcheng the Chinese deserted the citadel and fled during the night.

It is understood that one of the Japanese conditions of peace will be the founding of a buffer state between China and Korea.

PARIS, Nov. 6.—M. Hanotaux, Minister of Foreign Affairs, gave the Chinese Minister an audience today. It is understood he told the Minister that France could not initiate the peace negotiations with Japan for China, but would co-operate with the other powers in favor of peace.

LONDON, Nov. 6.—A dispatch to the Central News from Shanghai says the Chinese army has been thrown into a panic by the Japanese victories and is still fleeing before the Japanese. The Chinese troops in Manchuria are robbing the natives and committing horrible atrocities wherever they pass. The Japanese, on the other hand, are treating the Chinese well, and are consequently received with open arms by the natives, who are furnishing them with supplies of various kinds. Viceroy Li Hung Chang, the dispatch also states, has been ordered to Peking.

BURNED IN THEIR BERTHS.

Sad Fate of Two Steamboat Firemen at the Sea.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Nov. 6.—The tug Crusader was destroyed by fire at her dock early this morning. Firemen Billings, of this city, and Chas. Williams, of Port Huron, who were sleeping in the tug, were burned to death. The cause of the fire is unknown. The Crusader was owned by the Grummond Tug Company, of Detroit. Loss \$30,000.

Tammany and Hard Times Too
Big a Load to Carry.

The Republicans Carry New York
by a Big Majority.

Senator Hill and Possibly Congress-
man Wilson Among the Slain.

Reports of Republican Gains All Along
the Line from Maine to California.

Returns received from all parts of the United States up to midnight indicate that the Republicans will control the House of Representatives in the 54th Congress by a working majority. Until fuller returns are received it will be impossible to give the composition of the various State delegations in detail.

California.
Chairman Gould, of the Democratic State committee, claims the election of Budd (Democrat) for Governor, and three, possibly five, of the seven Congressmen.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 6.—Indications are that the Republican candidate for Governor is elected. Three Republican Congressmen are elected and the Republicans are claiming both branches of the Legislature.

Returns indicate the entire Republican State ticket elected by a good majority.

Delaware.

WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 6.—At 9:15 o'clock it looks as if the Republicans will carry Newcastle and Sussex counties and lose Kent county. This would give the Republicans the Governor, Congressman and United States Senator.

Dakota North.

North Dakota returns fairly complete indicate the elections of F. M. Kinter, Democrat, for Governor over Roger Ains, Republican and Prohibitionist, and E. D. Wallace, Populist. The fusion candidate, a Populist, is probably elected to Congress.

Georgia.
ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 6.—Georgia elects a solid Democratic Congressional delegation. Speaker Crisp has been re-elected to Congress.

Indiana.

The chairman of the Republican State committee claims Indiana by 60,000.

Illinois.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Chicago is conceded to have gone Republican on the State ticket.

The Republican State ticket is probably elected by 8,000 to 10,000 majority.

No one can give absolutely correct estimates on the result of the election in this State just yet, but everything points to a complete victory for the Republican forces, a largely increased vote for the Populists with little hope for the Democrats anywhere.

Iowa.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 6.—A small vote was polled in Iowa. Enough returns are at hand to indicate the election of the entire Republican ticket by 50,000, with the exception of Judge Granger and B. I. Salinger for the Supreme Court, whose opponents were endorsed by the Populists. The Republicans elected ten Congressmen.

Kansas.

WICHITA, Kan., Nov. 6.—The Eagle claims that Long, Republican for Congress, is elected by 1,000 plurality over Simpson, Populist, and that the State has gone Republican by 10,000 plurality.

Kentucky.

From returns up to 12 o'clock the Republicans claim the election of three Congressmen in Kentucky.

Louisiana.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 6.—Returns indicate the election of five and possibly six Democratic Congressmen in this State. Chairman Howbert claims the entire Republican State ticket is elected by 18,000 majority.

Senator Blanchard, of Louisiana, wires that a solid Democratic delegation is elected to Congress from that State.

Maryland.

Maryland's solid Democratic front has been broken, and the Republicans have made unprecedented gains in every direction.

Massachusetts.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Nov. 6.—Greenhage will have an increased plurality over last year with a somewhat smaller vote.

Minnesota.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 6.—Scattering returns from 40 of the 80 counties of Minnesota indicate that Gov. Nelson is re-elected. Figures at hand point to the election of a fusion Senate, but the Republicans seem to have a majority in the House sufficiently large to give them a safe lead on joint ballot.

Michigan.

DETROIT, Nov. 6.—Careful compilation of reports received by both State committees indicate the election of John T. Rich, Republican, for Governor over S. O. Fisher, Democrat, by from 30,000 to 50,000. The whole Republican State ticket is elected, with a solid Republican delegation to Congress, and Wayne county, in which Detroit is located, is Republican in all offices except treasurer.

Mississippi.

JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 6.—All the Democratic Congressmen from this State are elected by safe majorities, except in the fourth, fifth and sixth districts.

New York.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The election was remarkable for the general quietude that prevailed in the city, despite the intense party feeling that ran with great fierceness in every district from the Battery to Spuyten Duyvil. With the exception of a few ordinary encounters there was no happening that could be called riotous in any section. There was an ominous silence as the returns were read at Tammany Hall. "Tammany is beaten" was the cry that went around the hall. Mr. Crain introduced John B. McGoldrick, secretary of the Tammany Hall organization, and he met with a great ovation. "You have heard me announce," said he,

"in years past the victories of Tammany Hall. I have tonight, I am sorry to say, to announce a defeat. We have lost the city by 25,000 votes and the State by 100,000 votes. It has been a landslide—a tide that we could not stem. We have at any rate nailed our colors to the mast and fought to the last."

Women watched at the polls were an innovation this year. In most cases the women were treated with courtesy. The result of the election was received with great enthusiasm by the opponents of Tammany Hall. Dr. Parkhurst came into the committee of 70 headquarters at 7:30 o'clock and was immediately surrounded and congratulated by those present.

The Mail and Express says that the New York delegation in the 54th Congress will stand Republicans 25, Democrats 9.

At 9 o'clock tonight both Senator Hill and Governor Flower refused to discuss the election returns or to be interviewed on the situation.

The Brooklyn Eagle says that four out of five Brooklyn Congressmen are Republicans, while the World says that all five of the districts have gone Republican.

J. H. Manley, chairman of the Republican national executive committee, has sent this telegram of congratulation:

"Hon. J. W. Babcock, chairman of the Republican congressional committee of Washington, D. C.—I heartily congratulate you on the result of your labors. Our victory is perfect and complete from Maine to California. The result in New York is the grandest victory of all. We have laid this day a solid foundation upon which to erect in 1896 the structure of national victory for protection and prosperity."

At this hour (10 p.m.) the Republican victory in state and nation seems assured, although the chairman of the Democratic congressional committee is out with a statement that the Democrats still have a majority. In this State the Democratic route is complete. Hill is beaten by from 125,000 to 175,000, and involved in his defeat is that of his party in all the great cities of the State—New York, Brooklyn and Buffalo, which have gone Republican.

The Legislature is Republican by an increased majority, and the State's representation in Congress will be very largely Republican.

The Brooklyn Citizen in an extra at 10 o'clock tonight says that the Republicans probably carry four out of five Congressional districts in Kings and Richmond, and elect their local ticket by an average majority of 20,000.

The Republicans have made a clean sweep of Brooklyn. Morton carried the city by about 18,000. Sixteen of the city's 18 wards are carried by the Republicans. The fusion candidate, a Populist, is probably elected to Congress.

Ex-Mayor Grant issued the following statement: "We concede the loss of the State and acknowledge our defeat in the city." Park Commissioner Bell said: "It means a loss of the State to the Democratic party for twenty years."

The Mail and Express estimates that the Assembly will consist of 87 Republicans and 51 Democrats.

About 20,000 voters in Brooklyn are said to have been unable to cast ballots because of the slowness of others.

At Greeley and Herald squares the crowds were as dense as on lower Broadway, and if anything more enthusiastic. In front of the uptown offices of the different newspapers on upper Broadway the crowds were so large that it was with the greatest difficulty that the cable cars could make headway. As soon as the theaters had let out all the people who had spent the evening at the playhouses joined the mob on the streets, and by 11:15 p.m. it was almost impossible to get from one part of the town to another by way of Broadway.

Total vote for mayor in New York: Grant (Dem.) 106,052, Strong (Rep) 148,669. 2 a.m.—The Congressional representation from this State will stand Republicans 29, Democrats 6.

Nebraska.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 6.—Under the most favorable conditions anything like definite results in this State will not be known before noon tomorrow. Up to 10 p.m. only 70 of the 1,800 voting precincts of the State had been received. These show a slight Republican gain.

New Jersey.

TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 6.—A special from Allan L. McDermott, chairman of the Democratic State committee, says that the Republicans have captured the Legislature.

Returns at hand indicate the election of sufficient Republicans to give the Legislature to them by a majority of 23 on joint ballot, which insures the election of a Republican successor to Senator McPherson.

Ohio.

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 6.—Every precinct heard from shows decided Republican gains. The Republican committee claims all four Congressmen, and the indications are favorable for a Republican majority in the Legislature.

One hundred and fifty-six precincts show a net Republican gain over last year, when McKinley had a plurality of 80,695, of 471, and 30 precincts outside of Cincinnati show a net gain of 695.

Democratic State Chairman Taylor has just telegraphed, conceding the State to the Republicans by 90,000 plurality.

At 10 p.m. Chairman Dick, of the Republican State committee, sent a message to Gov. McKinley stating that the Republicans had carried the State by the largest plurality in the history of the State.

Pennsylvania.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 6.—Pennsylvania elects to Congress 20 Republicans, 3 Democrats, with seventeen districts to hear from. Returns from the State are meager and slow.

South Dakota.

PIERRE, S. D., Nov. 6.—The Republican plurality is 15,000 in South Dakota.

Tennessee.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 6.—In West Tennessee the voting was extremely light, and as the strong Democratic vote of the State is in this section there is anxiety among Democrats as to the success of Peter Turner for Governor. Democratic Congressmen have been chosen in the eighth, ninth and tenth districts.

Texas.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 6.—The complexion of the official roster of Tennessee is not changed by today's election.

Partial returns show a reduced Democratic majority in Texas.

Virginia.

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 6.—Further returns indicate heavy Democratic losses at nearly every point. The returns are slow,

and while the Democrats appear to have lost heavily, the returns are not sufficiently full to indicate that they have lost any of the districts.

West Virginia.

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., Nov. 6.—Reports from Wilson's district are meagre. All show large Republican gains. Charleston, Wilson's home, is among the towns giving gains. Democratic Chairman McGraw announced at 8:30 o'clock that he considered Wilson elected. At 10:30 p.m. there is scarcely a ray of hope for the escape of W. L. Wilson from the Republican deluge. Dayton has made gains in every county so far as heard from.

Wisconsin.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 6.—The Republicans claim the State by from 20,000 to 25,000.

The Republicans of Wisconsin have carried the State by over 15,000 plurality for Gov. Upham and the entire ticket.

Midnight Estimates.

At midnight indications point to a Republican plurality of 75,000 in Illinois. At midnight it is certain that the Republicans have carried Connecticut on the State ticket by from 5,000 to 10,000. Besides this they have gained three Congressmen.

The New York World and New York Morning Advertiser in extras issued at midnight say that the next House of Representatives will be Republican by a small majority.

All the election districts in New York give Morton 121,501, Hill 124,050, Wheeler 8,787.

The News in Washington.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 7.—Unusual interest in the results was manifested in Washington. The demonstrations of enthusiasm were remarkable, considering the fact that all the news was unfavorable to the party in power. Morton's victory and Tammany's downfall in New York seemed to be particularly pleasing to the people. At the White House Secretaries Gresham, Carlisle, Smith, Morton and Herbert listened to the bulletins received by Private Secretary Tinsler, and occasionally by a telephone message was sent to President Cleveland, who had gone out to his country home at 5 o'clock.

Disturbances.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Twenty-five deputy sheriffs sent to the drainage district to preserve order among the canal laborers were arrested at the polls in Lamont at the instance of the mayor and a Democratic Justice of the Peace, who claimed jurisdiction, refusing to release them, although bail was offered in any amount. William Lorimer, Republican candidate for Congress in the second district, objected to this proceeding, and upon his refusal to leave the poll room was seized by a Lamont police officer and thrown into the street. The deputies are still in jail.

There were several disturbances in the city during the day. Seven diggers gathered in front of the polling place in the 34th ward, 30th precinct, shortly after the voting had ceased, and overpowered the judges and clerks and carried away the ballot boxes. There were several fights at different polling districts, but no serious injury was done to anyone and but few arrests were made.

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 6.—There were several fights here during the day, one of which resulted in the death of one man and wounding of several others. In the fifth ward, which has a large Populist vote, John M. Gossone, one of the Populist workers, challenged a negro vote. In the difficulty that followed Gossone drew a pistol, and a general melee and fusillade of shots followed. Gossone was killed almost instantly. Among the wounded were Geo. Heckie, marshal of Summerville, flesh wounds; Dan Bowles, flesh wounds; Will Behr, seriously injured. All the parties were white. Others received slight cuts and bruises, negroes and whites fighting on both sides.

HURRICANE OFF NOVA SCOTIA.

A Vessel Goes Down With All on Board.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 6.—Last night about midnight a hurricane struck this coast and raged with great violence for the remainder of the night. The schooner Annie M. Fride is reported a total wreck. Bear Cove, 10 miles from this city, and all her crew of four men drowned. She was bound to Halifax from Mabon.

WITH THE WORKMEN.

There are prospects of another strike in the Connellville, Pa., coke region.

The rail straighteners of the Edgar Thomson steel works at Braddock, Pa., have refused to work under conditions prescribed for them, and a shut-down of the whole plant is threatened.
