EAST LIVERPOOL, Conn., May 10.—Fifty striking potters, with their families, have arranged to leave for England early next month to work in the English potteries. The men are all skilled workmen and more of the English strikers may follow them.

The riots of last week have had their effect on some of the unemployed foreigners. Yesterday 35 of them took passage for the old country to remain. Others are leaving for their homes in Poland, Hungary, Bohemia and Italy. They say conditions are better in the old country than here.
