THE PINOS CONTINUE TO GIVE IN!

Important Dispatch From Gen. MacArthur.

Americans Hopeful That the Conflict Will Soon Be Brought to an End.

Washington, March 30.-An important dispatch received at the war department yesterday from Gen. MacArthur at Manila dated Friday, chronicles the surrender of a considerable number of rebels and military arms, and the important feature of it is that the surrender marks the complete stamping put of the insurrection in the Island of Mindanao, which, next to Luzon, is the largest island in the Philippines. The

dispatch is as follows:
"Manila, March 29.—Brigadier-Gener al William A. Kobbe reports surrender Sumulao, Mindanao, 9 officers, 160 men, 87 rifles, 80 shotguns, Capistrano's command. This ends the trouble in Minda-nao as far as Filipinos are concerned. Brigadier-General Robt. P. Hughes reports Alikpali and Ruiz, 34 guns surendered to Capt. David G. Shanks,18th nited States Infantry, at Mamburao 206 guns, Fuller's command, surrender ed to Lieut.-Col. William S. Scott, 44th Inited States Volunteers. (Signed) MacArthur.

Manila, March 29 .- After being convinced of Aguinaldo's capture, General Geronimo, the insurgent leader in the Province of Morong, Luzon, has surendered with six officers. 46 men and 50 rifles to Col. As the news of Aguinaldo's capture spreads through the archipelago the insurgents are becoming disheartened, and there is a marked increase in the number of in-

Funston. The subject was considered in all its phases, but no definite conclusions were either with regard to Gen. Funston's reward or to the punishment of Aguin-

cabinet was that the time is not yet ripe to decide what course should be pursued in the disposition of Aguin-There is no disposition to deal otherwise than leniently with him, but there are various questions that will have to be considered in the case, as, instance, whether he personally instigated assassinations of Americans and similar offenses.

The trend of views, as expressed by the cabinet, indicated that ultimate transportation to some place of confinement outside of the Philippines was the course most likely to be adopted.
