The majority of the farmers are busy putting in seed, which no doubt was the principal cause of the small attendance. It is expected that the seedling will be completed about two or three weeks earlier this year than last. The winter wheat crop is reported to be in good condition, and should the weather be at all favorable there will no doubt be a large yield.

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Grain—Oats continue to be scarce and the demand good. Some of the buyers are of the opinion that as soon as the seedling is finished prices will drop. The general impression is that the oats are not in the country to make prices recede to any extent. Sales were made today at \$1.26 to \$1.29 per cwt.

Hay and Straw—Hay sold well today. There was 15 loads offered. Prices ruled at \$8.50 per ton for most of the best loads. Straw was scarce, one load being sold at \$6 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—The offerings today were small; prices were steady, at 21c to 22c for butter in casks, and 23c to 25c for pound rolls; most of the sales were made at 23c. Eggs were in good demand; sales were made mostly at 13c and 13 1/2c per dozen, white and light.

Vegetables and Fruits—Several large loads of potatoes were on sale; prices were steady, at 7c to 7 1/2c per bag, by the load, or 8c for smaller lots. Green onions, cheaper, at 3 1/2c per dozen. Spinach, 7c per bushel. Cabbages, 4c per dozen.

Dressed Hops—About 20 carcases offered. Prices were still higher at \$8.25 to \$8.40 per cwt. most of the sales being made at the latter figure.

Poultry—The offerings in this line were controlled by the hucksters. There was no change in prices from those quoted.

Butchers' Meat—Sales were brisk today. The supply was smaller than usual. Prices were unchanged.

Apples—A few barrels of choice apples sold at \$1.25, by the bag at 50c. Other kinds were dull of sale at 7c to \$1 per barrel or 20c to 25c per bag.

OLD LAKE CAPTAIN GONE

Death of Phineas Clark, a Native Londoner—Commanded Vessel at 20.

A dispatch from Detroit says: Capt. Phineas Clark, 78 years of age, one of the old-time vessel masters on the great lakes, is dead here. He was born at London, Ont., in 1825, took to sailing at an early age, and in 1845 was captain of the steamer Pacific, running between Chicago and Milwaukee. Later he was master of several boats and part owner of two. He retired twenty years ago.

LAND COMES HIGH

West London Breakwater May Not Be Completed This Year.

It is understood that the land the city has procured for the breakwater in West London totals in value between \$6,000 and \$7,000. As the city has only \$15,000 to spend on the breakwater under the debenture bylaw, it follows that only about \$3,000 or \$3,000 will be available for the land. Now, what the city engineer's estimate for the work was nearly double this sum, so that it begins to look as though the breakwater will not be completed this year unless the general funds are fallen back upon.

Assistant Engineer Pratt is busy these days making a survey of the breakwater, so that plans for the work may be prepared in sections.
