LOCAL CANDIDATES WHO SUCCEEDED

In the Recent Examinations of the Normal School.

ABOUT SEVENTY PASSED

Names of Others Who Were Successful, But Who Did Not Attend the Local Normal.

The complete course of public school teacher-training that until a year ago comprised three important stages, namely, a term at a county model school, a year's experimental teaching and a ten-months' term at a normal school, is now reduced to the third stage only, to be taken at a normal school. On the ground that the mere novitiate is not likely to be more efficient at the end of a term than those who have attended a model school and done a year's teaching would be at the end of six months' training, the latter are given a final examination in March. Of the 213 students attending the London Normal School about 70 of them were admitted to the short-term examination held last month.

Candidates who obtain between three-fifths and three-fourths of the total number of marks are awarded "pass" standing; those making three-fourths or over are given "honors."

The marks of the unsuccessful candidates, and the certificates of those who have succeeded in the examination will be forwarded to the Librarian, E. J. Bruce, at the Ontario Agricultural College, at the same time.

Permanent second-class certificates will be issued to the successful candidates who are 21 years of age, and interim certificates to those who have not attained that age.

Candidates who have been admitted to the Ontario Agricultural College will find cards of admission inclosed with their certificates.

Special candidates, including all members of the various religious communities, and others, who wrote on the examination, but were not in attendance during the session, are not included in the list. The standing of these candidates will be reported in the near future.

RAILWAYMEN EXPLAIN FREIGHT DIFFERENCE

Why It Is That the Rate From Boston Is Less Than From Montreal to London.

A statement has been made that local railroads favor American shippers as opposed to Canadians. This, it is explained by local freight men, is due to the different tariffs under which the rates are based. For instance, goods coming into Canada from American points are billed right through under the tariff established by the interstate commerce commission, and freight agents here base their collections on the bills accompanying the goods.

Canadian shippers, however, are governed by the rates established by the government commission, which are slightly higher than those in force in the States.

The rate on a shipment of goods coming into Canada from Detroit is 30 cents a hundredweight to London. Toronto is only five miles further, yet the rate from there to London is 32 cents. The first-class rate from Boston is 51 cents a hundredweight, while from Montreal it is 54 cents. Prior to 1908 it was still higher.

HAMILTON UNION DEPOT.

Hamilton, April 13.—Hamilton is to have a mammoth union station for the steam roads entering the city. With that purpose in view the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway is completing what is perhaps the biggest real estate deal in the city's history. It is acquiring all the property on the south side of Hunter street opposite the present station from James to John streets and will probably also take in the next block to Catharine street. The roads to use the new station will be the Canadian Pacific, T. & N. and the Michigan Central and Canadian Northern. The Grand Trunk may come in later.

LIBRARIANS' WOES OVER CHEAP BOOKS

Modern Paper Is Not Good and the Volumes Are Hard to Bind.

Toronto, April 13.—The Ontario Library Association this morning heard a discussion on the various charging systems, including fines on overdue books, by Mr. W. O. Carson, of London Public Library, and Miss Macdonald, of the Ottawa library, and Miss Jennie Reid, of the Chatham library.

Mr. Cedric Chivers, Bath, England, delivered an instructive little address on bookbinding.

"It does not matter how well a book is bound if the paper in it is rotten," he said. Bookbinders have had their troubles increased since the invention of making paper from pulpwood. The new process produces a paper which is very difficult to stitch together in a book.

Mr. Chivers hoped that the library boards in Canada would soon become educated to a point when they would see that the most expensive bindings were cheapest in the end.

Miss Drivell, of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, explained the library of congress card and index system.
