BETWEEN TWO FIRES.

The Orange Sentinel declares that it will be the duty of every member of the Orange Order to take an active part in opposing the return of the Laurier Government because of the school clauses of the autonomy bill. The Sentinel re-echoes the cries that were heard in the ears of the people of this city in the bye-election of 1905. It is a rechauffe of the sectarian campaign of the Conservative organ in this city. Laurier is pilloried again as the bond-slave of the hierarchy.

Simultaneously there is a blast from Le Manitoba, of St. Boniface, the organ of Archbishop Langevin. Its theory is that Sir Wilfrid Laurier denied the Catholic minority their simple rights at the demand of "Protestant fanatics." "True," says Le Manitoba, "the words 'Separate Schools' are to be found in the law organizing the western provinces, but the thing itself, the institution which appeals to one's mind when mention of Separate Schools is made, the Catholics of the west have not. This law, in so far as it relates to education, is trumped, always the sad trump, from the sad consequences of which we have been suffering for the last twenty years. Skill is shown in saturating public documents and laws with the words 'religious teaching,' 'Separate schools' and such, but other provisions are there to bring back the schools to the heathen ideal. Of what use is the permission to retain a Catholic teacher if, by law, that teacher is compelled to behave himself, during the class hours, as a pagan teacher? Of what use is the permission to reserve our money for our own schools if that school be by law, such a school, as the next one, a neutral school? In truth is this a great privilege, a privilege such that we should have great gratitude towards him who has consented to this legislation. In reality, this so-called privilege is only a mockery."

In Quebec the Nationalists, the Catholics, and a large section of the Conservative party, are in full cry against Laurier as a traitor to his race and religion. "He has trampled under foot the rights of the minority," says the Conservative candidate in Compton. The Conservative organ, L'Evenement, calls upon French-Canadians to defeat him because he is too anxious to conciliate the English element.

Between the Catholic and the Protestant extremists, and assailed by both, Sir Wilfrid stands on good middle ground. And these moderate Canadians of all shades of belief should stand with him.

A PLEA FOR THE CONSUMPTIVE.
The statements in Rev. Canon Hague's letter in last night's Advertiser, as to the need of provision for consumptives, are to the point. The present situation is, indeed, monstrous, as the rev. gentleman says. The ratepayers have shown themselves ready to respond to the call of humanity, and the responsibility rests with the men who from motives of pique or personal spite have buried their kindly intentions.

Those who have specially interested themselves in the project of a consumption hospital have every hope that obstacles will be overcome, but it will be months before a beginning can be made, and meantime there are pitiable cases, for whose care and segregation there is no provision whatever. A local physician states that rarely are there less than twenty while others there are as many as thirty, victims of tuberculosis in this city. The majority of these unfortunate are denied proper care and are allowed to mingle with their families and carry contagion beyond their own homes.

Steps should at once be taken to care for consumptives until a permanent hospital has been established. Nor should the matter be left to private individuals; the board of health and the city council should take it up. As a temporary arrangement an isolated building beyond the city limits might be secured, where cases like that of the unfortunate man Smith, and those in the last stages of the disease, might be sent.

On Monday next the international congress on tuberculosis will open at Washington and continue until Oct. 12. It is intended that this congress shall mark the beginning of a concerted campaign by municipalities and governments against the disease. The medical men have mapped out the campaign and pointed the way,

and so far as this province is concerned, it now rests with the Government, councils and boards of health to carry on the fight. Neither Ontario nor London has as yet taken its fair share in this crusade against a common enemy.

LONDON'S UNIVERSITY.

The project of a civic university has been launched under promising circumstances. The members of the board of governors are public-spirited citizens, with large interests in the community. If they are so minded, they can insure the success of an undertaking rich in possibilities.

The small university is capable of a great work, a proof of which may be found in the Maritime Provinces. It has some advantages over the big university, where the mere size of the student body makes it difficult for undergraduates and teachers to come into intimate touch. Except in honor science and cognate work, requiring costly laboratory equipment, there is no reason why the arts department of the Western, with a modest but assured income, should not be as efficient as that of Toronto. Only a small proportion of those who enter a university specialize in sciences. For the great majority of young men and women in Western Ontario who aspire to a degree in arts, the Western will meet all requirements, if it can be placed on a sound financial basis, even in a small way.

The city's annual grant of \$5,000, added to students' fees, will make a fair start, but only a start. In simple justice aid should be given by the Ontario Government, which collects thousands of dollars yearly in London and Middlesex in the form of succession duties, for the maintenance of Toronto University. The object should also appeal strongly to citizens of wealth. The Western must depend to some extent upon private support, and we look to see one or more chairs endowed and scholarships established by men of means.

A university on a firm foundation will bring an arts education within the reach of many in this city, and in these western counties, who could not otherwise afford it; just as the London Medical School has opened the door of the medical profession to many a struggling youth in this neighborhood. To put it on no higher ground it will be a great practical advantage to London to become the seat of a live university. The city would take its rightful position as the educational centre of Western Ontario. Many families would take up their residence here on that account, and there would be a dollars-and-cents value in the presence of a large number of students.

TWISTING THE FIGURES.

An example of the naked misrepresentation that is becoming habitual with some of the enemies of the Laurier Government, is the following from the London Free Press:

"The expenditure of last year was \$198,000,000 in round figures. The expenditure in 1893 was \$36,000,000."

There is no excuse for this. A copy of the public accounts is in every editor's library, or should be. The expenditure chargeable to consolidated fund in 1893 was \$36,814,052, and in the short fiscal year, 1907 (nine months), \$51,542,161, or \$77,500,000 for the twelve months ending March 31, 1908. If our contemporary pleads that in the figures for last year it includes all expenditures (consolidated fund, capital account, railway subsidies and miscellaneous), why does it not do the same in 1893? It ignores the expenditures on capital account, the railway subsidies and miscellaneous charges in 1893 in order to make an untruthful comparison. It ignores the fact that in 1893 there was a deficit of over half a million, and in 1908 a surplus of \$19,000,000, which was applied to public works, including the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. It ignores the fact that the public debt was reduced from \$48 96 per head in 1893 to \$42 84 last year.

Why not substitute argument for falsehood in assailing the Government?

Mr. Borden says he has the same policy for all the provinces. But he doesn't talk high tariff in the west.

The rain has considerably held off for the Western Fair and the Laurier meeting. It is now welcome to pour.

The Quebec Nationalists are with Borden, of course. Laurier is too British for them.

The G. T. P. will roll back the map of Canada a hundred miles. That is Laurier's epigrammatic way of stating a cold fact.

If an Irishman wrote that letter he either perpetrated a rich Irish bull, or more likely is laughing in his sleeve at the Tory Gazette for publishing a eulogy of the new cabinet minister.

A FRENCHMAN IN LONDON.

One of the most interesting of recent French visitors to London, "Mars" (Maurice Bonvallet), the artist, whose humorous and satirical sketches have kept France laughing for twenty years, left British shores the other Saturday.

Before his departure from London "Mars" expressed great admiration for the policemen and the omnibuses. He had much to say about Englishwomen, "Your really well-dressed women," he said, "equal the best-dressed Frenchwomen—because they are obviously middle-class and working-class women are not well-dressed in French eyes. Our lower classes are better turned out—they have a better eye for a line."

And what I particularly notice is that your women—regard them as wives, sisters, or sweethearts—seem the complements of the men. They are just the perfect other half, the exact being one expects."

"Women in London walk so well. Our women mostly 'mince' or ride. Frenchmen and women might cross to London, if only to see the women walk. They are so energetic."
