SPEER'S END IS CALLED NATURAL

There Is a Tragedy in the Mystery.

Buffalo, Aug. 28.-After long silence, the local papers are breaking into the declaration that Speer was not asnot taken home dead on a Saturday night, and died from purely natural causes on a Sunday afternoon. The

"District Attorney Wesley C. Dud-

ley, cognizant of the hundreds or rumors which have been affoat since Speer died, also interested because certain friends of Speer have urged that all mystery be cleared away in justice to them, to Speer and to his family, has been making a quiet but thorough investigation. The inquiry has been hampered by the absence from the city of the physician who attended Speer, Dr. John H. Pryor. that the district attorney cannot call to him to make statements, certain persons who may have been with Speer, if he intends to follow his informal investigation with a presentation of the case to a grand jury. "Whether or not what the district attorney so far has ascertained, or what he may ascertain later, will justify taking the Speer case to a grand tury for formal investigation, is a question none now can answer positively.

"District Attorney Dudley can apply to a court for an order to exhume the body of Speer. To do that, with any certainty of obtaining the court's permission, the district attorney must be able to show reasonable probability that Speer was murderously assaulted, or that there was something criminal in connection with his death.

"Many theories are talked of as to the causes of Victor Speer's death. "First-Speer died as the result of an assault, committed upon him by some person with whom he quarreled or who bore him a serious malice. "Second-Victor Speer died from poi soning, either taking the opiate with suicidal intent or through accidentally taking what was an overdose, considering his physical condition on the night he returned home after visiting Medina and Williamsville

"Or, third, and lastly, Victor Speer' death was due to natural causes, as stated in the certificate of death made by Dr. John H. Pryor, the physician who was called by Mrs. Speer, Sunday afternoon, and who attended him
