CORONER'S JURY URGES RE-ARREST OF NEGRO

Verdict Given by Investigators of Windsor Murder.

Windsor, Oct. 23.—Saturday night the coroner's jury investigating the death of Thomas Mills, the aged man who was found beaten to death in the M. C. R. yards, brought in a verdict placing the responsibility on Samuel Dalton, a negro, who was arrested in connection with the case but later released. The jury urges that he be rearrested.

PAVING PROBLEM FOR SARNIA COUNCIL

Question of Paving Cromwell Hill to Be Discussed.

Sarnia, Oct. 22.—The regular meeting of the town council will be held in the town hall tonight. The principal item of business to be transacted will be the question of paving the Cromwell street hill. The present condition of this thoroughfare is an eyesore to the people of Sarnia, and at the meeting tonight the question of the cause of payment to be held will be discussed.

DEANERY OF BRUCE MFT AT WALKERTON

Autumn Session of Chapter Proved of Great Benefit.

Walkerton, Oct. 22.—At the invitation of Rev. R. Perdue, of St. Thomas Church, Walkerton met here for their autumn session. The meeting was a red letter day in the chapter's history, the lord bishop being present for some part of the time and helping the clergy with advice and counsel. Also the members and delegates had an opportunity of seeing the splendid new church built by the efforts of Mr. Perdue and his church workers.

On Tuesday evening the lord bishop held a confirmation service, which will long be remembered by the visitors for its helpful character and the beautifully rendered service by a vested choir of thirty-five voices.

On Wednesday, the day began with a celebration of holy communion at 8 o'clock, followed by a service for the clergy with the bishop of the diocese. At 11 a.m. the chapter met to transact deanery business.

The following clergy were present: Rev. L. W. Dehl, R. D. Rev. W. Henderson, Rev. E. Softley, Rev. P. M. Powell, Rev. A. Richardson, Rev. H. A. Wright, Rev. R. W. James, secretary-treasurer. The Rev. T. B. Howard, the diocesan secretary of Sunday schools, was also present.

It was decided on the invitation of Rev. W. Henderson to hold the next meeting in Walkerton, after which the Rev. T. B. Howard gave a talk on the work of Sunday schools in the diocese.

At 12:30 luncheon was served in the basement of the church, the lord bishop occupying the seat of honor.

It is the general opinion that when the Walkerton people are asked anything they do it well, and the luncheon and the way generally that the members and delegates of the deanery chapter were treated was no exception to this rule.

At 3 p.m., the convention opened with an address on "Feed My Lambs." This was to have been taken by Rev. C. V. Lester, of T. R., but owing to an attack of grippe, he was unable to be present, and the Rev. W. Henderson took up the subject for the allotted time. He gave an address which impressed those present very much with the fact that both clergy and laity should do more than in the past in this important work of training the young.

The Rev. T. B. Howard was asked to give a paper on the "Boy Problem." Mr. Howard is a specialist on the subject, and dealt with it fully. He pleaded very earnestly for a kindly treatment of the boy, especially between the ages of twelve and sixteen, remarking that up to the former age the boy lives on the faith of others, and up to the latter he was often struggling to form one of his own, and so needed all the help others could give him.

The Rev. A. W. Richardson followed with a paper on "Revivals." He pointed out that there existed in the early Jewish church and in the non-Christian religions, and maintained that they were as necessary today as then. During the discussion it was urged that more use should be made of the seasons of Advent and Lent for these times of reviving and refreshing.

BOURASSA TALKS OF HIS POLICIES

Declares How He Stands With the New Government.

HAS'N'T CHANGED VIEWS

Nationalist Chief Reiterates His Statements in Regard to the Navy.

Chambly Canton, Que., Oct. 22.—Another Nationalist demonstration, to celebrate the victories of the recent election, was held here this afternoon, which was joined in by about 2,500 people. It had been expected that Hon. F. D. Monk, the new minister of public works, who joined Mr. Bourassa in the Nationalist campaign, would be the principal speaker, but he did not turn up.

The speaker of the meeting was presided over by G. N. Ducharme, a life-long Conservative, and S. Willett, an old-time Liberal, who joined the Nationalist movement last election, and a general jubilation was held over the appointment of Mr. Bourassa, who ran as a straight Nationalist for the county of Chambly-Vercheres. Mr. Bourassa, however, in his speech made very laudatory remarks of the work of Messrs. Borden and Monk, as well as Messrs. Bourassa and Laverne, all of which were greeted with cheers.

Bourassa's Position. Mr. Bourassa made his first appearance for some time, having been resting at his home since the close of the election. As to the new Government, he could say nothing regarding its policy. But he declared the Nationalist group, which he led, would occupy the same position to the new Government as to the old. He, however, criticized those who declared the appointment of Col. Sam Hughes to the cabinet, and "good old J. R. Sproule" to the Speakership, declaring that these same people had welcomed their support in the past when any attack upon French-Canadian or Roman Catholic rights was to be made, as well as when they supported Laurier in sending troops to South Africa without a mandate from the people.

For the rest, Mr. Bourassa declared his ideas regarding the navy, demanded a thorough investigation into the administration of the various departments at Quebec, and declared that so long as the Borden Administration gave an honest and economical government so long would it receive the support of himself and his friends.

The general trend of Mr. Bourassa's speech indicated him in the role of an apologist for the Borden Government, and a critic of the late Liberal Administration.

RAILWAYMEN REFUSE TO ACCEPT REPORT

Resolutions Repudiate Finding of English Railway Commission.

London, Oct. 22.—Railwaymen held meetings in many places throughout Great Britain today, at which they repudiated the report of the English railway commission. References to the report were punctuated with angry and derisive shouts. Mrs. C. W. Williams, of London, a member of the National Society of Railway Servants, addressing the men at Sheffield, admitted that the report, embodied many improvements, but that it was an absolute disgrace to suggest that the men continue under present conditions.

A resolution passed refused to accept the commission's findings, and asked that the executive of the various unions immediately convene a national conference to frame better conditions for employment, and to submit the plan forthwith to the railway companies for adoption.

When the commission was appointed in August the board of trade announced that the railway companies had agreed to accept the findings. Several leaders now say that neither the men nor the executive were consulted, that the railway companies had agreed to accept the findings, and that they will not recognize such an obligation.

CONSUMPTION RAVAGING QUEBEC PROVINCE

Death Rate From White Plague One of Highest in World.

Montreal, Oct. 22.—The ravages of tuberculosis in this province were made startlingly plain by the report of the annual meeting of the King Edward Institute for the Prevention of Tuberculosis yesterday. The report showed that the death rate in the province from the disease was one of the highest in the world, that the death rate among women was twice as high as among men, and that the disease was more prevalent among the French-Canadians than among the English-speaking population.

He said, however, that while statistics showed the disease to be gaining ground, that was not the case, as in previous years many cases were unreported, but now that the institute was at work practically every serious case was noted. He urged the city to keep the streets cleaner and to provide for the inspection of dwellings.

He also declared that more help was urgently needed from the authorities to supplement private enterprise. It was announced that the Duke of York had accepted the honor of president and the Duchess the honorary presidency of the "Ladies' Committee."

The treasurer's report showed a deficit of \$2,000. Seven hundred and twenty-two deaths in the city were recorded and 229 in the province. In the last year, 1910, the total number of deaths was 1,000.

FATALLY SHOT

Montreal, Oct. 22.—Mr. B. G. McNabb, manager of the new business department of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company, shot himself fatally while duck-hunting in the vicinity of Sorel. His gun exploded prematurely, and the charge entered his body, causing fatal injuries. An inquest was held on Saturday night at Sorel and a verdict of accidental shooting was returned.

ARREST CHIEF OF COUNTERFEITERS

Police Made Important Find in Wilds of West.

GREEN GOODS PLANT

Complete Photographic Outfit For Reproducing Face of Notes.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 23.—Combining the skill of the artist and the artisan, Albert Leon, alleged chief of a gang of counterfeiters, arrested in New York Monday, was well equipped had he desired to manufacture spurious currency.

When Secret Service Operatives Thomas B. Foster and W. A. Glover, assisted by Constable Wm. McLeod, of the British Columbia Provincial Police, visited the workshop and hiding-place of the gang in the wilderness stronghold on Nootka Sound they found much evidence of the chief's skill.

Discovery Follows Arrest. The discovery of the island retreat of the gang resulted from the arrest of Leon in New York. The operatives were at once ordered to find the hide-out and get an evidence which might be connected with the case.

This island fastness is supposed to have been the manufacturing centre for the spurious bills which Leon's cleverness is said to have made possible. Everything about the place indicated that the directing leader is no bungler in whatever he undertakes.

As an artist Leon is unusually clever. The secret service men found in the log cabin, where he lived with the nihilists, a number of water color sketches of island places that are faithful to nature and show some degree of art. There were, besides, many photographs of the camp, the hide-out, and the surrounding landscape. The photographic outfit for reproducing the face of ten-dollar notes, is taken as circumstantial evidence of the man's guile.

Leon is charged with the circulation of large amounts of ten-dollar notes over the Pacific coast. Two of his accomplices, Rudolph Sepperson and Fred Marquardt, were arrested in Chicago a couple of weeks ago, charged with attempting to pass spurious money made by Leon. The alleged chief of the gang was arrested in New York just as he was about to take a steamship for South America.

The method Leon is supposed to have used was to photograph faces of real notes and reproduce them by silver print process on a specially-made paper that resembles the bank note paper. The notes then required some retouching by hand to produce the secret marks and threads, and a was here that Leon's artistic ability is supposed to have been of use. The only flaw found in the notes is the color, which is slightly different from real notes.

Cabin No Ordinary Structure. Leon's hide-out on Nootka Sound a log cabin which is no ordinary structure. In every detail of workmanship the stronghold is pronounced complete in its construction. It is situated five miles from Friendly Cove, the spot where the explorer Vancouver met the early Spanish explorers of Puget Sound.

It was said to be in the almost untouched Canadian wilderness. At Friendly Cove there is an Indian village and one white trader. Steamships come to Nootka Sound, and the cabin is five miles from this remote settlement, in a small cove, and is reached by a trail.

When the secret service men reached this cabin they found there five Russians, who had fled from their mother country and claimed to have taken up home-stays in Canada. A caretaker was in charge of the cabin, and the Russians and the officers that Leon had once lived there. All professed ignorance of Leon's operations.

WOMEN MAY TRY THE McNAMARAS

Some Possibility of Their Being Called for Jury Work.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 21.—A jury list for the McNamara murder trial by Jan. 1, 1912, was the prediction made today by Attorney Clarence Darrow, chief of counsel for the defence. With no court today, opposing counsel took opportunity to finish up the work of the first complete court week in the trial of James B. McNamara for the murder of Charles J. Haggerty in the Los Angeles Times building explosion.

District Attorney Fredericks and Clarence Darrow, the legal chiefs for the prosecution and defence in the McNamara trial, have under consideration the question of whether by reason of the adoption of the constitutional amendment, giving women the right to vote, the sex will be called upon to serve as jurors in the dynamic case.

"There is no reason that I know of why women should not serve," declared Clarence Darrow to a Sun reporter yesterday. "I don't know whether it will be necessary to go outside of the present jury list or not, but if so, women who are on the assessment rolls are just as eligible to serve as jurors as any man would be."

It has not been decided that the women will be called on this case yet," said G. Ray Horton, deputy to District Attorney Fredericks. "The district attorney and myself, with the other deputies, have had this matter under consideration. The legal points involved have all been thrashed out, but that work is going on now. It is possible, and indeed probable, that if the present jury list is exhausted and the sheriff is sent out into highways and byways of Los Angeles in search of jurors, he will be expected to draw no line between men and women."

U. S. FLAG BARRED FROM PICTURE FILMS

Censorship Board of Toronto Orders Stars and Stripes "Cut Out."

New York, Oct. 22.—Manufacturers of moving-picture films here are disgusted over an order from Toronto that the United States flag must be cut out of films sent for exhibition in the Ontario capital.

Films depicting civil war incidents are said to have been sent back a week ago as showing too much waving of the Stars and Stripes. This was regarded as no more than natural, but when a film showing the rescue of a drowning man was sent back because the launch effecting the rescue had the American flag flying at the stern, the film-makers expressed wonder. They attribute the rejection of the film to the anti-reciprocity campaign.

The wrecked film, it is said, was sent back with the curt order: "Cut out the Stars and Stripes." This order purports to be signed by George E. Armstrong, chairman of the censorship board, Toronto.

Toronto, Oct. 23.—The report that the Stars and Stripes had been ordered cut out of moving picture films shown here has been confirmed.

OTTAWA CLAIMS 90,520

Over Four Thousand More Than the Population in 1910.

[Canadian Press.] Ottawa, Oct. 21.—Official figures for 1911 issued by the civil assessment department today give Ottawa's population as 90,520, an increase of 4,414 over the population of 1910, and 4,180 greater than shown by the recent Dominion census. The total of 90,520 would have been exceeded by at least 1,000, it is stated, had not the count been taken during the summer season.
