Total British Casualties Since War Began, 381,983

London, Sept. 14.—3 p.m.—Official announcement was made today in the House of Commons that the total of British war casualties up to August 21, was 381,983 officers and men killed, wounded or missing.

Losses of the British army during the summer were somewhat smaller than in April and May. The last previous statement of total British casualties was made by Premier Asquith on June 9. It gave a total of 278,069 up to May 31. The losses from that time up to August 21 are, therefore, shown to have been 123,915, a daily average of about 1,500. In the two months before the end of May, the period covered in the preceding announcement, the

osses averaged roughly about 2,000 a day.
