Question of Arbitration Not an Issue at the Present Time.

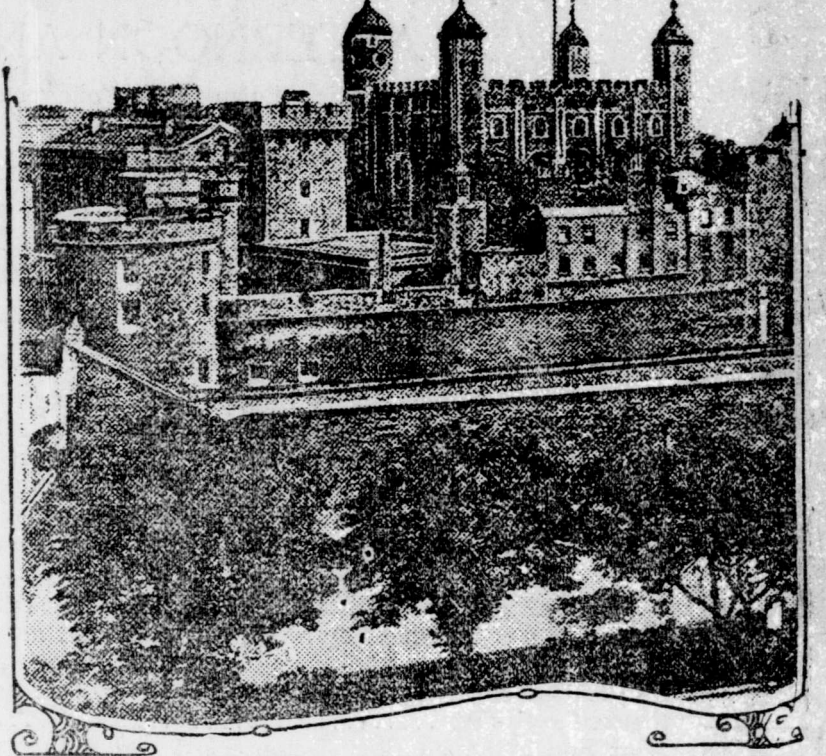
BERLIN IS NOW NOTIFIED Officials Hope That Knowledge of Facts May Bring Good Results.

London, Sept. 14.—6:55 a.m.—The town of Phocaea, Asia-Minor, 25 miles north-west of Smyrna, is reported to be in flames, according to a Reuter dispatch from Athens, which says it is inferred that the Turks are destroying coast towns, and retiring into the interior in expectation of the fall of the Dardanelles.
