Conditions In United Kingdom Need Careful Attention Yet

The forthcoming number of the Weekly Bulletin of the Commercial Intelligence Service, dated October 2, reports that general business remains inactive in the United Kingdom, and such few signs of recovery as are visible refer to future prospects rather than to actual conditions. The returns of overseas trade for August show an increase of £8,000,000 in imports and £9,000,000 in exports over July, but these are attributable to relief caused by the termination of the coal strike rather than to any revival of business. Otherwise the month's totals represent little more than half of the figures for the same month a year ago.

Regarding unemployment, the 2,170,000 wholly unemployed and 988,000 on short time, which was reported on July 1, has been reduced to 1,527,000 and 400,000 respectively on September 2. An outstanding feature of the past month has been the demonstrations and disorder among the unemployed in their endeavor to secure relief from municipalities and the Government. The situation has determined the Government to open an investigation which will probably lead to the institution of relief works.

A universal agitation is in progress against the lack of proportion between the prices which retailers are demanding for food and other commodities in comparison with the manufacturers' and wholesale prices, which are now falling; and as a number of influential journals are waging a campaign against the rapacity of the retailers, and publishing definite figures showing the wide margin between what prices are and what they might be, it seems probable that their crusade will force down prices to a level, which will eventually lead to a general revival in home trade.

REJECT RENO DIVORCE PLEA IN BIGAMY CASE

Halifax Judge Convicts Former Windsor Resident.

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 7.—Frederick G. Richardson of Halifax, Rev. Nev., and Windsor, Ont., was found guilty of bigamy in the supreme court here this afternoon. Justice Wallace reserving sentence until his counsel could be heard. Evidence was submitted to the court to show that Richardson married in England in 1886, and lived there with his wife some eighteen years, after which he came to Canada alone. Correspondence between Richardson and his wife gradually ceased.

SATISFIED FLINT NOT IN SURFACE

TORONTO, Oct. 7.—The investigation opened by the department of highways into a complaint that flint used in surfacing on the provincial highway near Jordan, was causing serious damage to automobile tires, has convinced W. A. McLean, deputy minister, that the complaint was without foundation. It was learned that the contractor, who owns a quarry in the district that produces a flinty stone—had not used any of it, but had used a stone from quarries at Dundas, which have been supplying material for use in many sections.

Hon. F. C. Biggs announced that a check for approximately \$700,000 had been received by the provincial treasury from the Federal Government on account of good road construction in the province.

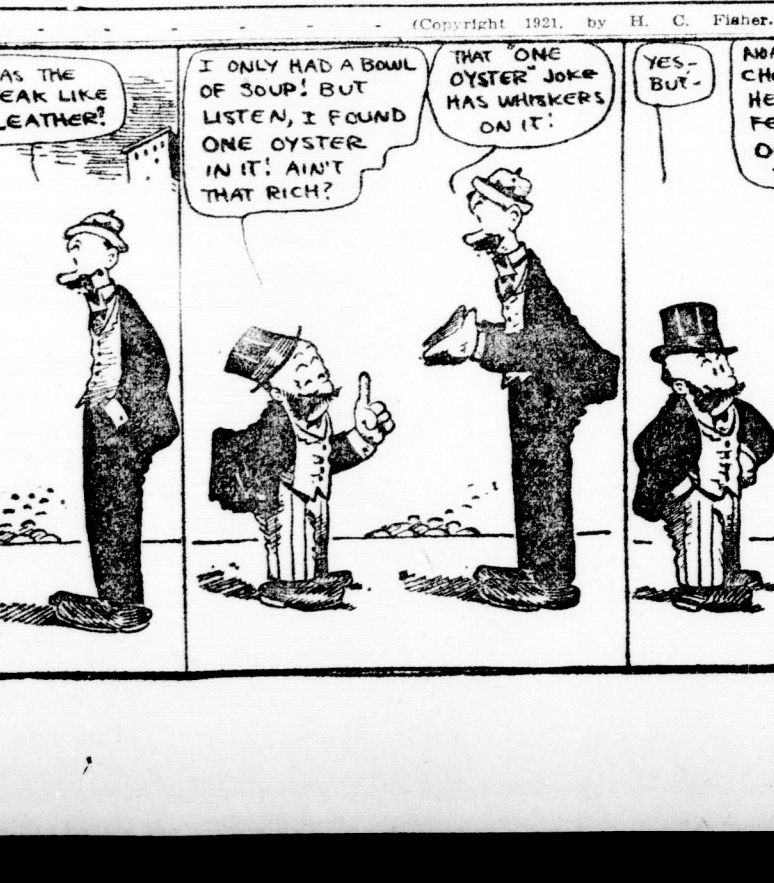

GERMANY'S JOBLESS PLACED AT 250,000

Unemployment Steadily Decreasing Despite Cry of Ruin.

BERLIN, Oct. 7.—Germany's dollar hysteria was temporarily checked when the quotation for the mark rose to 123 for the dollar. There was a runaway bull market in which some stocks rose 200,000, and even 500 points.

Germany's "catastrophe propaganda," continues unabated, and, if anything, intensified, sending out the S.O.S. in a particular effort to catch Uncle Sam's ear. A typical instance is afforded by the Deutsche Zeitung, which says: "If help comes, it must come quickly; otherwise the mark catastrophe, which must bring Germany a new wave of higher prices and new domestic political dangers, will become an international catastrophe, the consequences of which for all countries cannot be foreseen."

While Germany has been crying catastrophe for months past, she is enjoying a steady, consistent decrease of unemployment and probably has the lowest unemployment rate among the world war belligerents. The August figures, just available, show only 108,000 men and women in Berlin receiving unemployment support, a decrease of 15,000 since the previous month. The number of unemployed in all Germany today is probably less than 250,000.

Incidentally, the Germans have just discovered that America, far from having waxed rich and profited hugely through the war, which has heretofore been a fixed idea here, has home troubles and economic problems. The published figure of 6,000,000 unemployed in America and news dispatches of "auctions" have brought about this German awakening.

Using the head line, "Unemployment Misery in America," the Socialist Vorwarts says: "Reports tell of great want among 6,000,000 unemployed in America, and, since the crisis in America is further aggravated by the sinking of Central European exchange as the result of the reparation payments, one can count on unemployment in America increasing."

For the first time since the revolution the official German foreign trade statistics have been made public. If they are trustworthy, they indicate that German commerce is not all rosy. The June imports were 5,400,000,000 paper marks, and the exports 5,400,000,000. The May imports were 5,400,000,000, and the exports 5,500,000,000. America must have had a big share of Germany's imports, for 71 per cent in June consisted of agricultural products, chiefly grain, cotton holding second place.
