James Morton Flays Two as Greatest Evils of U. S. Republic,

Montreal, Nov. 27 .- Apart from the negro problem in the south and the Oriental question in the west, the two great evils which must be fought in the United States today are the Hearst press and the Ku Klux Klan, according to James Morton Jun. of New York, who addressed the members of the Reform Club at their weekly luncheon on Saturday.

In dealing with "race prejudice a menace to civilization," the speaker chiefly dwelt on the problems of his own country; but he also spoke of d'état which has direct results.

Mr. Morton's solution to the racial problem was the breakdown of the language barriers by the universal teaching of Esperanto.


