SAYS INDIFFERENCE SPIRIT OF THE AGE

Rev. J. Bruce Hunter Sounds Note of Warning During Sermon.

Characterizing indifference as the spirit of the age, Rev. (Major) J. Bruce Hunter, B.A., B.D., sounded a note of warning of the awful pain of indifference to God in the course of his sermon, "Tragic Indifference," in First Methodist church last night.

Mr. Hunter's sermon, the third in his series on "Familiar Age-Long Experiences," was preached to a congregation which taxed the capacity of the large auditorium.

Pointing out the inadequacy of having but a single life, Mr. Hunter declared that people can only climb the heights when they have seen the vision of the heights. The vision must be backed by some vital force.

"We hear something in a sermon and we resolve in our minds to go out and live up to that, but at the end of the week it seems to have lost its charm and magnetism," observed the speaker. "We need the flash, but we must have the glow, the religiousness, in order that the flash may be marvellously and wonderfully maintained. We have our moments of vision and dreams. They haunt us and we give ourselves to them for the moment. But unless they are fed and supported, unless we make them the business of life, then they fade and are gone forever. Vision requires nurture as well as birth.

"We must feed our ambitions with our life's blood," pursued Mr. Hunter, "and unless we are willing to have our ideal come and give it all we have that ideal will never be realized. When our ideals are followed by the resources of need and compulsion then we develop and make a contribution worth while to the world. It is not brains that the world needs; it is heart."

"We must ask ourselves whether our lives are squaring with ideals," asserted Mr. Hunter. "The greatest condemnation God can bring mankind is to say that he is neither hot or cold. We must remember that the ideal is a failure unless it is fed with the food that comes from the very soul."

COMMUNIST HITS CRUSADER ORDER

Speaker Also Compares Work of Lenin With That of Gompers.

The Most Noble Order of Crusaders, the latest invasion of the field of secret societies in Canada, of which a convulsion has just been established in London, was the subject of a bitter criticism yesterday by Tim Buck, the communist orator from Toronto. Tim Buck, who was the speaker of the day at the Lenin memorial service held by the communist party in St. George's hall, was, after his address, asked for a criticism of this new movement.

"You can take the Crusader movement in two ways, as the joke that it is, or the dangerous society which it would be," he said. "From the point of view of freedom of the individual, it contains the germ of the most dangerous theory this country has ever witnessed. It is based on the theory of government by force, which is the active principle of the Fascist in Italy. Just as the Klu Klux Klan in the U. S. its reaction concealed in the form of a tempting ideal, so this 'Crusader' movement, claiming to be impartial in its treatment of all national questions, deceptive in its real intention. But there is one thing I will prophesy and that is this, and it has to do with their claimed impartiality, in the next federal election whenever that may come, you will find the Crusaders most active where there is the strongest radical movement and their activity will not be in the interests of labor."

At the head of the movement is the famous Colonel Currie of Toronto. In Great Britain there are 30,000 members, he more or less openly boast that they are without the law. It is said by some of their members that they are so well organized and so well equipped with automobiles that at any given time they can concentrate in any place a large well drilled force within forty-eight hours. Now what are they doing all this drilling and organizing for? Is it to repel foreign enemy? The constitution of the order says they are to abolish strife and class war in their own and individual country. I leave it to you, with your experience of the last five years in Europe and the States, as to the probable victims of the most noble order of Crusaders in Canada."

LAUDS LENINE

Mr. Buck, dealing with the memorial service in honor of Lenin, compared his regime in Russia with that of the late Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor in America. He was unequivocal in stating that the theories of Lenin had proven the usefulness of labor, while the regime of Gompers had spelt lack of progress to American labor.

"Gompers," he said, "was one of that class of men who used labor as a step to higher material things and success. He was one of that long company that includes such men as John L. Lewis, Bill Green, Frank Hayes, John P. White, and Philip Hanna, all of whom, having started as leaders in the mine workers' union, have advanced to positions of ownership, or state position. Gompers believed that it was necessary that labor should treat with capital and bargain with it for a few of the things it needed."

Lenine, on the other hand, realized that to bargain was merely to stave off the hour of action, and he would have none of it. To him the class war was as unending as Marx was a reality not to be dismissed with compromise. He acted on this theory in Russia. Later he revised his theories, but not that changing course, but in order that the rule of the proletariat and the citizen might be sustained. With him it was always the people. With Gompers it was compromise and dodging.

Gompers was the friend of kings and emperors. Lenin was alone. After he was dead the European and American press called him a sincere man with no personal ambition. That was this year. In 1917, at the time of the revolution, the same papers accused him of receiving \$5,000,000 from Germany to with-

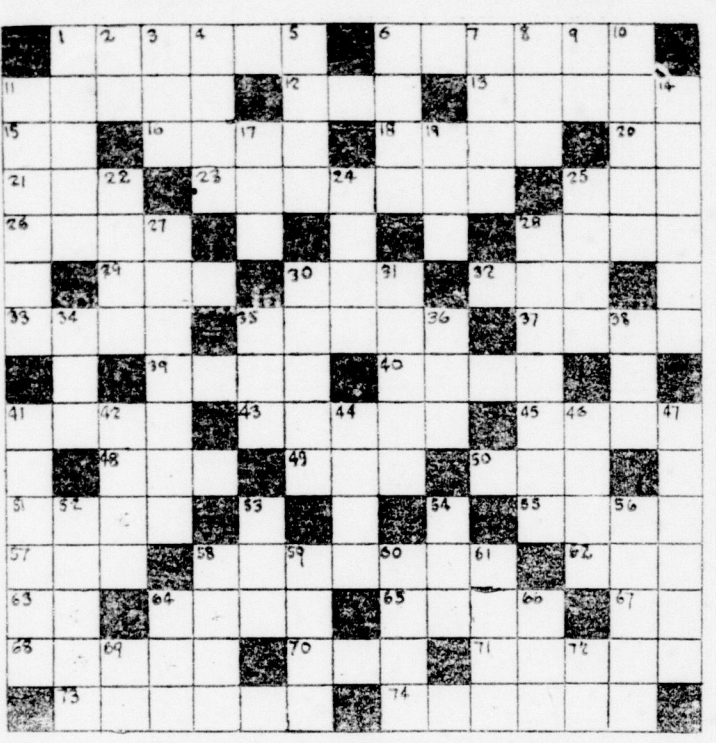
Each word reads from left to right (horizontal) or downward (vertical) according to position. Lettered in correctly, words that cross will interlock.

10-YEAR-OLD TWINS DIE IN BATHROOM

Death Overtakes St. Catharines Ladies While They Are Bathing.

St. Catharines, Jan. 25.—The ten-year-old twin sons of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Everett of Thorold, were asphyxiated by illuminating gas fumes while taking a bath at their home late Saturday night.

The parents of the boys detected the gas fumes emanating from the bathroom when they went upstairs to retire and on unlocking the door found the two boys dead in the bathtub. Efforts of four doctors who were summoned to the Everett home proved unavailing as the boys apparently had been dead for some time. It is thought that the boys had turned on the gas heater and failed to light it.
