Many Guns Bursting.

Oct. 13, 1915.—I have written to Asquith to call his attention to the shell question. Our guns are bursting, and unless our people profit by the sad experience of the French, we may have the disasters they have had in gun-bursting. Kitchener a short time ago admitted that compulsion was necessary, recently he has recanted and has not made up his mind which side of the cabinet will win. Arthur Balfour is strongly against compulsion. Carson is for compulsion, but I hear that another matter in which he did not concur with the majority of his cabinet colleagues was the Salonika expedition: he wanted the question decided on strictly military and not political considerations.

YEAR'S TRADE BALANCE **FAVORABLE TO CANADA**

Number of Proposals Ad- Dominion Exports Increase in 1924 by 45 Million Dollars, While in Same Period Her Purchases Abroad Decrease by More Than Ninety Millions.

Trustee Bryden N. Campbell, retir- EACH PASSING MONTH SEES IMPORTS DROP

Ottawa, Dec. 30.-A reduction of approximately forty-five million dollars in the grand total of Canada's trade, with a big decrease in imports and an increase in exports during the year ending tomorrow, as compared with the calendar year, 1923, is indicated by figures available here.

Trade figures for the eleven months ending November 30 have been compiled by the dominion bureau of statistics. The figures for December must necessarily be in the nature of an estimate as complete returns will not be available until about the middle of January. However, by assuming that the trade during the present month approximated that of December 1923, it is possible to arrive at an estimate for the total trade.

Total imports into Canada during

Total imports into Canada during the present year will, it is estimated, be to the value of approximately \$810,900,000. This is a decrease of more than \$90,000,000 from the figures for 1923, when total imports reached the figure of \$903,030,515.

Exports of domestic goods, however, will show an increase over the 1925 figures. They will probably amount to approximately \$1,060,000.000 as compared with \$1,014,944,274 in 1923. The increase in the value of domestic exports will therefore probably amount to approximately \$45,.
