That is the only way we have hope of having a successful homecoming for the boys and girls next year."

COMMUNISTS END 24-HOUR STRIKE

Paris Police Do Not Expect a
Renewal of Yesterday's
Rioting.

Paris, Oct. 13.—The 24-hour general strike called by the Communists, ending officially at dawn today, but transport workers in the vicinity of Paris attempted to prolong the walk-out and met with some success among the drivers of auto buses and taxicabs. There was, however, a noticeable increase in the number of taxicabs on the streets, and the general public felt little inconvenience.

Most of the factory workers and building workers who were out yesterday returned to their tasks this morning, and the police felt little fear of a renewal of yesterday's rioting in which two persons were killed and some 30 wounded. The police maintained their vigilance, however, posting strong forces at possible danger points.

PRACTICAL BANKING LECTURES PLANNED FOR SCHOOL PUPILS

Students Will Be Shown Various
Phases of Money
Handling.

ILLUSTRATED TALKS

Trafalgar public school pupils are to have the unique experience within the next few days of hearing practical lectures on banking. V. M. Bray, manager of the Hamilton road branch of the Bank of Commerce, is co-operating with Laurence D. McCamus, B.A., principal of Trafalgar school, in the new and novel scheme of educating the boys and girls of the seventh and eighth grades in banking procedure.

Mr. Bray will give illustrated talks on the simple methods of customer banking, dramatizing the practice, following this up by a concrete drill. A bank staff will then be formed of members of the class, manager, accountant, teller, ledger-keeper, and all customers, all of which will be called upon to go through the movements of depositing money, drawing it out, borrowing money, handling drafts and promissory notes, and in fact, everything connected with banking.

Principal McCamus feels that the practical training thus received, supplementing the saving habit inculcated by the penny bank system, will be of immense value and service to the boys and girls as they proceed to take their place in life.

CARDINAL'S BROTHER IS ROBBED OF \$5,000

New York Burglars Take Jewels
and Priceless Royal
Decorations.

New York, Oct. 13.—Domingo Merry Del Val, a Spanish diplomatic agent and a brother of Cardinal Merry Del Val, has been robbed of priceless royal decorations and jewels valued at \$5,000 by burglary in his New York apartment.

Senior Merry Del Val discovered the burglary on his return to the apartment after a week-end in the country. The apartment, on East 54th street, just off Fifth avenue, had been ransacked. Diamond-studded cuff links, watches and other small but valuable gems had been taken, as well as a gold jewel-encrusted decoration as commander of the Order of the British Empire and decoration as a member of the Order of Isabella the Catholic. Various diplomatic papers, including his passport as messenger for the Spanish king, were untouched. Jimmy marks in the woodwork showed the burglar to the apartment where he had been forced.

PARKHILL PASTOR TO HOPE CHURCH ALDERMEN FAVOR FEWER GAS PUMPS

Rev. Thomas Bingham Accepts
Post—Begins Next
Month.

Rev. Thomas Bingham, Parkhill, has accepted the call extended to him by Hope Baptist church, Westminster township, and will enter upon his new duties there the beginning of next month.

Mr. Bingham, who was born in Stockport, England, came to Canada about 30 years ago, accompanied by his wife and family of seven children. Shortly afterwards he was appointed superintendent of the Baptist mission field embracing Bracebridge and Gravenhurst churches. Subsequently Mr. Bingham was pastor of congregations at Schomberg (First and Second King), Langton, Walsh and Pine Grove, Burk's Falls, Colorado (Mexico), Annapolis, Dutton and Parkhill. In all of his charges Mr. Bingham has given particularly valuable service and his ministry has been rich with fruitful success.

Four of Mr. Bingham's sons entered the ministry: Rev. Wm. J. Bingham, D.D., who prepared for medical missions in Guatemala and now labors in Mexico; Rev. H. H. Bingham, D.D., now of First Baptist church, Calgary, formerly of Talbot street church, London; Rev. C. C. Bingham, now of Memorial Baptist church, Edmonton, formerly of Eglinton street church, London; and Rev. Ernest J. Bingham, who after serving important churches in Canada, moved to Florida, where he died. On a number of occasions Mr. Bingham has been honored by the church and his four sons conducted evangelistic campaigns in Canada and the United States with splendid results.

Baptist clergymen of the city who are personally acquainted with Mr. Bingham consider that Hope church is fortunate to have secured his services as pastor so shortly after having formed itself into a self-sustaining church.

debentures has never actually been collected by the commission. "There is not a single business that can prosper unless the men interested in it have faith in it, and if men on the commission do not believe in the London and Port Stanley Railway commission, they are best thing they can do is resign. Why should the mayor and Mr. Burdick stay on the commission if they believe the road is in the condition they say it is?"

"The London and Port Stanley Railway is not in a dangerous position," concluded Mr. Pocock, "and there is no reason for the alarming statements that have been made concerning it by the mayor and Mr. Burdick, who have offered nothing but destructive criticism since they became members of the commission."

Should Cut Service.
That the London and Port Stanley railway is not paying and that the service should be cut somewhat during the slack season to cut down overhead, is the opinion of George F. Burdick.

In an interview with The Advertiser at noon today, Mr. Burdick said that his only interest in suggesting cuts in the railway system of operation was to make the railway pay. If possible, although it did seem that this could not be done.

"Others are grumbling when anything is suggested, among them are Philip Pocock. Why did he not make the railway pay when he was on the commission?" said Mr. Burdick. "The report of yesterday's meeting as printed in The Advertiser was correct," he continued. "I suggested a revision of the schedule for the winter months to cut overhead. I believe that was a reasonable attitude to take. I did not have anything to do with the statement of the mayor's that the road owed the city \$500,000."

"I do not believe that the road owes the city that much. As a matter of fact, I asked the mayor how he arrived at such a conclusion."

Mr. Burdick added that the growing amount of motor car traffic to the lakeside was making it increasingly difficult to make the railway pay and the situation might just as well be faced as it was already facing the people.

Coroner Mitchell at the inquest at Drumbo last night stated he had received a phone message from Paris stating the money and watch belonging to Carr had been found in the latter's room at Paris, but was at a loss to know who had telephoned the message.

Chief Fewtrall cleared the air this morning when he replied in answer to a question from The Advertiser that it was he who had telephoned the Coroner at Drumbo.

The contents of Carr's stomach were sent to Toronto this morning for analysis. In the meantime, no further developments are expected.
