Disensions in the Congregation
Regarding Rev. J. Ballantyne's
Call.

Ottawa, May 1.—The difficulties in
Knox church over securing a minister still
continue. An evening paper stated that the

to-day has the following:—This is entirely
misleading, not to use a stronger term, and
must have been expressed for a purpose.
The fact is that, although members were
importuned and solicited at the church
door on Sunday, both before and after
service, and the call has been hawked
round from house to house to secure
signature, a large number have refused
to sign. Intense dissatisfaction exists at
the methods employed to secure support.
They are said to be unparalleled in the his-
tory of the church in Ottawa.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

THE CANADIAN CATTLE QUESTION IN THE
HOUSE OF COMMONS.

T. W. Russell's Retirement—Rope
Walkers on Strike—A Bomb in
Guildhall—Movements of the
Queen—True Bill Against Anar-
chists—Emperor William III.

London, May 1, midnight.
King Leopold's Daughter III.
Princess Clementia, youngest daughter
of King Leopold, is ill with a bronchial
affection, which threatens serious conse-
quences.

True Bill Against Anarchists.
In the general criminal court of the Old
Bailey to-day, the Grand Jury brought in
true bills against the Italian Anarchists,
Francis Polti and Joseph Farnace.

The Crew Safe at St. Pierre.
The British bark R. th. Capt. Anderson,
from Belfast, April 17, for Miramichi, was
sunk at sea by collision with an iceberg.
Her crew have arrived at St. Pierre.

Protection of Coal Miners.
A battalion of Austrians arrived at
Ostrava, Serbia, this morning to protect
the coal miners there. This action was the
consequence of the discovery of a plot to
destroy the mines on May Day.

Fire in London, Eng.
A store occupied by the Waterbury
Watch Co. at No. 7 Snowhill was destroyed
by fire last night. By the falling of the
roof of the building several persons were
injured, but if them was a fireman.

Not Infected with Cholera.
The Lisbon Government has decided to
declare that Lisbon is not infected with
cholera. This decision has been reached
on the strength of the report of the Board
of Health, which declares the present
disease to be diarrhoea.

Refused the Amnesty.
A Cape Town despatch says:—The re-
bellious Doroand Chief, Withool, who
has for some time been a thorn in the
side of the German colonists, has contemptu-
ously refused an offer of amnesty, made to him
by the German authorities.

Unable to Send a Delegate.
The Government of Canada having re-
plied that it is impossible to postpone
colonial conference called to meet in Ot-
tawa in September next, the Government
of Cape Colony has intimated that it will
be unable to send a representative.

A Three Months' Tour.
A Belgrade telegram says:—King Alex-
ander has arranged to make a three
months' tour of the continent, and will
possibly extend his trip to other than con-
tinental countries. Ex-King Milan, his
father, will act as regent in his absence.

Rope Walkers on Strike.
A despatch from Brussels says:—A thou-
sand rope walkers struck at Hamme, in
East Flanders, this morning and organized
a procession. The parade had scarcely
got in motion when the crowd began
throwing stones, smashing windows, etc.,
and the police charged upon the mob and
dispersed it.

Another Anarchist Arrested.
The Brussels police this morning made
arrest on the person of Baron Dugley, a
Russian, who has made himself conspi-
cuous by his avowed sympathy with Prince
Krapotkin, the Russian Socialist. In the
Baron's apartments was found a large
quantity of Anarchist literature, which
was seized.

Further Restrictions on the Press.
The Vienna Government has informed
the parliamentary press committee that it
will not sanction the publication of
newspapers in the streets, but, on the
contrary, will increase the strictness of
its control over the press. In cases where
journals are seized, however, the Govern-
ment will at once give to the editors of
such papers its reason for such seizure.

Poisoned by Potato Salad.
The mess of the 35th Artillery Regiment,
stationed at Darmstadt, was served with
potato salad, of which a large number of
the men partook freely. Shortly after eat-
ing the salad they were seized with violent
pains and cramps, and thirty of them were
taken to hospital, where it was discovered
they were suffering from the effects of
poison. The military authorities are pur-
suing a rigid investigation.

Movements of the Queen.
The Queen is to arrive at Buckingham
Palace on Thursday, and Her Majesty will
stay in town until Saturday evening,
when she will return to Windsor. There
will be a dinner party at the Palace
each night of the Queen's stay.

The Queen to leave Windsor
Castle for Scotland May 22.
starting about 10 o'clock. The royal train
will proceed by the Great Western &
North-western Railways to Warrington,
and thence by a specially constructed line
to Trelam locks, where the Queen is to em-
board on board the admiralty yacht En-
chantress, which is to convey her
along the ship canal to Trafford
wharf, opposite Salford docks, a
distance of about 9 miles. The Queen
will drive through Manchester in an open
carriage, and the day is to be observed
there as a public holiday. Her Majesty
is to leave Manchester about 6 o'clock, and
will probably dine on the train, which is to
proceed to North Ballister by the usual
route, and will arrive at Balmoral on Wed-
nesday and will stay five weeks.

Mr. T. W. Russell's Retirement.
Edmund Yates cables thus:—"Every-
one regrets that Mr. T. W. Russell has all
but made up his mind to retire from politi-
cal life, for if he does resign his seat for
South Tyrone it is highly improbable that
he will stand for any other constituency.
It is incorrect to say, as some have done,
that he has formed his plans in conse-
quence of a difference of opinion with
those Irish Unionist members who are also
landlords. His views on the land ques-
tion have for a long time been known.
The real reasons for the step
contemplated are the urgent personal de-
mands chiefly as follows:—In the first
place Mr. Russell stands in need of a trip
for recuperation, and if he leaves Parlia-
ment he will probably soon afterwards
start on a long sea voyage. In the second
place there are business concerns which
need his closer personal supervision. Sev-
eral of the most influential of his col-

leagues are using arguments that are likely
to prove cogent to induce him to retain
his seat in the House. He is too good a
fighter to lose.

Correspondence on the Cattle Ques-
tion.

The correspondence exchanged between
the Board of Agriculture and the Colonial
Office concerning the admission of Cana-
dian cattle into Great Britain was made
public to-day by the Board of Agriculture.
The Colonial Secretary, in his last com-
munication, dated April 26, quotes M.
Nocard, a French expert in cattle diseases,
as saying that what is known in the west-
ern part of the U. S. as cornstalk disease,
which is only feebly contagious, has often
been mistaken for pleuro-pneumonia. M.
Nocard, in a report to Sir Chas. Tupper,
the Canadian High Commissioner, in Sep-
tember last declared that the condi-
tion of the lungs of Canadian cattle,
which had been submitted
to him for examination, was identical
with the condition in the corn stalk dis-
ease. After calling attention to the fact
that there has been no outbreak of pleuro-
pneumonia since the alleged outbreak in
1890, and to the fact that only eight
suspected cases have been found among
300,000 imported cattle, and in view of the
evidence furnished by the Canadian Gov-
ernment, the Colonial Secretary says that
he cannot admit that Canadian cattle are
affected with any other disease than that
attributed to hardship and exposure on the
journey from their pastures to Europe.
He expresses the hope that the Board of
Agriculture will finish its special examina-
tions by the middle of June, so as not to
interfere with the trade. In conclusion,
he says that he will suggest to the Cana-
dian Government the propriety of having
all cattle destined for Great Britain suit-
ably marked, to the end that suspicious
cases may be easily traced to the herd
from which they came.

The Canadian Cattle Question.
In the House of Commons to-day Mr.
James Rochefort McGuire asked the Gov-
ernment concerning the proposed examina-
tion of lungs of Canadian cattle to be
slaughtered at the port of landing. Mr.
Herbert Gardner, president of the Board
of Agriculture, said that such an examina-
tion would be begun on May 16. The
results of the examination would be sub-
mitted to him, and he would then decide
whether it would be proper to allow cattle
to be imported alive. Sir Edward Clarke,
Conservative, moved an amendment to the
Registration Bill, that the House decline
to proceed altering the entire elective sys-
tem of the country, unless the measure
shall contain proposals to redress the
existing unequal distribution of electoral
power. The aim of the amendment is to
reduce the representation of Ireland, the
west of England and the outlying parts of
Scotland, and increase the membership of
London, the Midlands and Lancashire,
the seats of the great manufacturing
and commercial centers of the country.

Another Earthquake in Greece.
A despatch from Athens says a severe
shock of earthquake was felt here at 2.25
o'clock this morning, which was followed
at brief intervals by several lighter shocks.
None of the shocks did any damage.
From the various stricken districts
throughout the Kingdom reports are com-
ing in slowly, but sufficient information
has been received to justify the statement
that at least 500 persons have lost their
lives either directly through earthquake or
from subsequent exposure. Terrible
suffering among the homeless is reported
from all the stricken districts, the inhabi-
tants being greatly in need of food, cloth-
ing, medicines, etc. The few buildings
left standing are so badly shaken that they
are likely to tumble down any minute, and
are consequently not available as places
of refuge. The amount of damage to prop-
erty cannot be estimated.

Returns from the Gamblers' Mecca.
The annual meeting of the Monte Carlo
Gambling Company was held in the Casino
yesterday. It was stated that the total re-
ceipts for the year just closed were 22,000,
000 francs, a decrease of 2,000,000 francs
as compared with the year which closed at
the end of April, 1893. The comparative
decrease at the end of January was 3,000,
000 francs, but the tables have since been
