

BRITANNIA RULES.

The Prince of Wales Yacht Scores Her Fifth Victory Over the America's Cup Champion.

Saturday's Great Lacrosse Match—Bicycle Races at the Hill This Evening.

GLASGOW, July 11.—The Vigilant and Britannia started in a race to-day for £50, under the auspices of the Royal Northern Yacht Club, over the Rothesay course.

After the start round the yachts were to sail diagonally across the quadrangle course from Rothesay to Larga and return.

The Mount Steward mark was rounded by the Vigilant at 11:18:20, and by the Britannia at 11:20:50.

The wind dropped somewhat in the broad stretch with booms to port from Mount Steward to the flagboat at Larga and the Britannia crowded up on her opponent.

In the windward work to Mount Steward the Vigilant showed her main boom out and prepared to see her spinnaker after rounding the Larga mark, which she rounded at 11:30:35.

The Britannia rounded the Rothesay flag boat 23 minutes ahead of the Vigilant. Time—Britannia, 1:45:45; Vigilant, 1:48:10.

The Britannia won by 21 minutes and 21 seconds actual time, and 24 minutes and 21 seconds corrected time.

THE "DUGUAY-TROUIN."

The French Man-of-War Brought to Moorings in Esquimaux Harbor.

She Will Remain Here Ten Days Before Proceeding to Hawaii.

There was a great burning of gunpowder and exchange of naval courtesies in Esquimaux harbor yesterday afternoon when the French man-of-war Duguay-Trouin steamed into port and was promptly moored at a distance from the Royal Arthur and Hysciath, the two British men-of-war now lying there.

ABOARD THE FRENCHMAN all was business and bustle during the rest of the day getting things ship-shape and cleaning up after the voyage. Not till to-morrow will the public be allowed to visit the cruiser.

THE DUGUAY-TROUIN is a second-class cruiser of 3,500 tons. Besides ten heavy guns, she carries an auxiliary armament of four quick-firing guns and five machine guns. She is 300 feet long and sails sixteen knots an hour.

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BRITISH DEATH DUTIES.

The Dominion Government Strongly Opposed to Levies on Property in Canada.

Such a Policy Would Raise Questions in Every Way to Be Deprecated.

LONDON, July 11.—Sir Charles Tupper, Canadian High Commissioner, sent recently to the Marquis of Ripon, Colonial Secretary, a letter on the subject of Sir Wm. Harcourt's proposed estate duty, and the modifications which the Chancellor of the Exchequer had allowed in deference to colonial opinion.

MEMORIAL TO CONGRESS ASKING FOR THE REMOVAL OF THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL. PHILADELPHIA, July 11.—The memorial prepared by the Knights of Labor to be presented to Congress asking for the impeachment of Attorney-General Olney is as follows: Your memorialists most respectfully represent that they are citizens of the State of — and of the United States;

That Richard Olney, the Attorney-General and head of the department of Justice of the U. S., has been guilty as such Attorney-General of crimes and misdemeanors which subject him to impeachment and removal from office in pursuance with the constitution and laws of the United States.

THE KNIGHTS OF LABOR met here this morning and decided to pay no attention to General Master Workman Sovereign's call to go out on strike. They found that they had no particular grievance and did not think striking out of sympathy would do themselves or anyone else any good.

CLEVELAND, July 11.—A telegram has been received from Mr. Sovereign by the Knights of Labor countermanding the strike order.

SOVEREIGN'S APPEAL. CLEVELAND, July 11.—The executive committee of the local Knights of Labor held a special meeting this afternoon for the purpose of discussing the following telegram received early this morning from Master Workman Sovereign: "Stand by the cause. See appeal to the press."

THE TELEGRAM IS CONSIDERED equal to direct recommendation to strike. The executive committee will probably call a meeting of all the local unions, and the question as to whether or not the local unions shall quit work will be asked upon it. It is the general impression in labor circles that the knights will join the strikers.

EARTHQUAKES IN TURKEY. CONSTANTINOPLE, July 11.—Four more earthquakes were experienced here to-day. The Grand Bazaar and several houses were rased. A hundred and fifty people were killed and wounded. The number of killed and wounded has not been learned. The shocks were felt in Dardanelles, Fris's island, Prinkapo, Galata, Stafa, where a number of houses were wrecked. Scores of people were killed. The village of Adabazar was obliterated. On the island of Haliki all the houses were wrecked. A portion of the Ottoman naval college fell, killing six. A priest was killed at the monastery by a portion of the building falling on him.
