BIG INCREASE IN GAME LICENSES

Province Gets \$56,000 During Past Season—North Shore Provides Most.

The present season for big game hunting is reported to be the best ever experienced as far as concerns the receipts paid into the provincial treasury from license fees paid by hunters. A great influx of non-resident hunters is the cause of the record total.

Col. T. G. Loggie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, stated today that the receipts from the sale of game licenses had totalled \$56,000. The increase was about seven thousand dollars over total of the preceding year.

The total announced for the fiscal year is not the total for the game season as the end of the financial year of the province comes on October 31st which is in the middle of the game season. November will provide a considerable number of game licenses sales thus increasing the total.

McAdam is looming large as a place of sale of game licenses as many of the parties from the United States purchase their licenses at the place immediately after entering the province. North Shore points also are reporting heavy sales of game licenses. That is accounted for by the fact that an increasing number of parties from Middle Western States enter the province at those points, the ticket agents in the United States routing them over the C.N.R. via Moncton.

The revenue received by the province from the Crown Lands in spite of the depressed state of the lumber market, have reached a most gratifying total. Some payments have come in since October 31st but as the books of the province close on that day they will not be shown. The total from stumpage was about \$1,100,000. Fredericton Mail, Friday.

AN EXCELLENT U. S. OFFICIAL

Among the floral tributes at the funeral of Private Armand Comeau, whose body was brought home from France by the American government for burial was a handsome wreath from American Consul Woodward, who saw to it that all honor was paid this Canadian who enlisted in the American Army in May, 1918. The entire expense of bringing the remains home and of laying them to rest at St. Anne de Restigouche, the deceased's former home, was borne by the American government, and American Consul Woodward in seeing that the U. S. flag also the flags of the American vessels in port, were flying at half mast, as well as placing his services at the disposal of the bereaved family in which this official is performing his duty for the government he represents.

NEW RICHMOND CENTRE.

Again the angel of death visited our neighborhood and bore from our midst a venerable and much respected resident in the person of Joseph Hardy, at the advanced age of eighty-two. The late Mr. Hardy's parents came from Miramichi after the fire of 1825 and settled at Collins Brook, where the deceased was born.

McColm and one sister Mrs. J. Woodman and a number of grand-children, all of whom have the heart felt sympathy of the community. The impressive funeral service, which was conducted by Mr. McKay assisted by Rev. J. F. McCurdy and Mr. Viret, was largely attended, showing the esteem in which the deceased was held.

BIG SCHOONER IS IN TROUBLE

Sailed From Campbellton And Ran Ashore in Strait of Canso.

Halifax, Nov. 8.—The American four masted schooner Mary Mason, Gruener from Campbellton, N. B., for New York, went ashore on Judique Shoals, near the entrance of the Strait of Canso, this morning. She was coated later at high tide by the trawler Venosta, and towed into Port Hawkesbury.

The extent of the damage to the ship will not be known until an examination is held. She lost several sails in the recent gales off the coast. The Gruener has a cargo of lumber registers 599 tons and hails from Boston.

CANDIDATES IN NORTHUMBERLAND

Labor Party and Independent Liberal May Make Four in Running.

Newcastle, N. B., Nov. 8.—That there will be three, probably four, candidates in the field for federal honors seems eminent this morning. Word from Chatham indicates that W. B. Snowball will run as an independent; Morrissey and McCurdy are the Liberal and Conservative candidates, while Joseph P. Manderson, president of the Northumberland Independent Labor party, announced to your correspondent this morning that he would be a candidate as a Labor man.

FLOUR GOES DOWN.

Flour took another drop of thirty cents per barrel on Thursday, due to the decline in wheat values, making the wholesale price \$9.20 per barrel for Manitoba and \$8.60 for Ontario. Granulated cornmeal fell twenty cents a box and is now valued at \$3.10. Oatmeal dropped twenty cents a barrel and is quoted at \$8.30. A reduction of 25 cents a hundred pounds of sugar was also announced and it is now quoted at \$7.25.

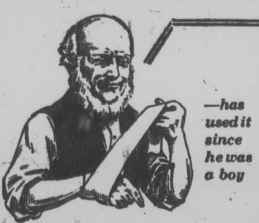
