MURPHY'S HOGE SWINDLE STILL IN OPERATION.

A Few Interesting Facts Connected with the "Lottery"-How it is Managed-Time for the Authorities to Take

GUELPH, Aug. 30 .- The promoters of the Guelph lottery, otherwise called the Guelph opera house company trust, are still going shead with the scheme. John L. Murphy, the secretary, and "Johr Robertson and Wm. Smith on behalf of a number of shareholders," have scattered circulars by the thousan 1 all over the country. It is well known that both the latter names are bogus, and simply mean John L. Murphy and Frederick Jasper Chadwick. But few tickets are being sold in this neighborhood. The people here know the promoters too Most of the receipts now coming in well. are from the province of Quebec and from the United States. Murphy claims that his daily remittances are very heavy, and that he has already a large sum of money on hand. The original board of trustees being satisfiel that the scheme wes a swindle, declined to act, entirely withdraw. ing their names. The trustees as now given are N. Higginbotham, John Harris, George A. O'nard and Edward O'Connor. Your correspondent believes he is correct in stating that the two first-named have also

withdrawn. It is hardly to be wondered that they should do so when it is considered that not one single dollar of the money received is deposited in the bank to their

THE ISLANDS OF DEATH.

Ice-Whole Towns Swept Away-Isl ands Engulfed.

The attendance was much greater than on any of the previous days of the tournament. As the final match for the single-hundred ohampionship approaches, excitement seems to be greater. It now rests between Hellmuth of London, Out, and Farnum of Newport, N. Y. LONDON, Aug. 30 .- Particulars of the voling the southeast coast, and gradually spread match took place on the Delaware river this until it formed a lurid red canopy. The hissing of the sea became deafening, and the waves rushed up to an unprecedented height. When deviath came an enormous

hissing of the sea became destending, and the waves rushed up to an unprecedented height. When daylight came an enormous tract of land had disappeared fifty miles square. In this were the villages of Negery and Negery Babawang. The natives sost-tered sparsely through the forests, and on the plains escaped death. The loss of life at these-points must sggregate 15,000. The entire Kandang range of mountains, ex-tending 65 miles, has gone out of eight. The town of Kaneraug, within 26 miles of Batavis, was swept away by a lava stream and half of the population (1800) perished. At Speelywick red hot rocks set fire to the houses and swept away all the thickly settled portion of the town. Ten bazaars belonging to Europeans were de-stroyed, but no lives are known to have been lost.
