The platform committee presented a long report. After setting forth the principles of denotracy, it calls for a change of government on account of the frauds and jab-bing which have been brought to light in every department of the republican admin-istration. All taxation should be limited to the requirement of economical coverament. ments of economical government. The necessary reduction in taxation can and must be effected without depriving. American labor of its ability to compete successfully with foreign labor and without imposing

lower rates of duty than will be ample to cover any increase in the cost of production which may exist in consequence of the higher rate of wages prevailing in this country. Sufficient revenue to pay the expense of federal government economically administered can be got under our present system of taxation from custom house taxes on a few imported articles, bearing heaviest on articles of luxury and bearing lightly on articles of necessity. We therefore desired the characteristic straight of the control of the articles of necessity. We therefore de-nounce the abuse of the existing tariff and, subject to the preceding limitations, we demand that the federal taxation shall be exclusively for public purposes, and shall not exceed the needs of the government
