

RUSSIA HOPES FOR PEACE.

HER PREDICTIONS OF A CONFLICT
WITH AUSTRIA UNJUSTIFIABLE.

The Czar's Government sends a Circular to the Foreign Courts in Austria the Situation is Not Regarded as Portending Immediate Danger.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 8.—Well informed persons here believe the Russian Government's intentions are entirely pacific, and that public opinion in Russia is also in favor of peace. The prediction of an approaching conflict between Russia and Austria are not more unjustifiable after the recent Imperial meeting in Berlin, as the rapprochement there effected can but contribute to the general peace of Europe. The city of London is expected to be attacked by an enemy against which no preparation has been made in view of the important military preparations now proceeding in Austria.

A Russian Circular.

Berlin, Dec. 8.—The Russian Government has sent a circular to its representatives at foreign courts in relation to the Czar's recent visit to Berlin. The circular draws attention to three points: First, that the Czar's conversation with Prince Bismarck showed that the Russian Emperor was not the slightest reason for a breach between Germany and Russia. Second, that Prince Bismarck promised that Germany would remain neutral in Bulgarian affairs, and third, that both Governments should order newspapers to adopt a moderate tone in their statements on the subject of the Czar's visit. The forced documents are not mentioned in the circular.

No Immediate Danger.

Paris, Dec. 8.—In the best informed circles the situation existing in Poland is not regarded as portending immediate danger. Nothing more will be done yet beyond the sending of a warning to Russia that Austria is watching, and will not least attempt any further military measures that Russia may take. Austria will not precipitate counter measures, because she does not desire to have Russia without a loophole, or to give her the appearance of being due to Austria's assistance. It is expected that Austria will grant to Russia a brief delay for further negotiations. An explanation of the missing of her troops, and the Austrian preparations will quietly continue.

The Defense of Galicia.

Vienna, Dec. 8.—The War Office is taking measures to permanently increase the facilities by which troops can be mobilized and to place at the disposal of the Government a large number of Przemysl fortresses, the most important defense works in the province, is being surrounded by a network of railroads and a trunk line has been added to the Hungarian Galician Railway. Other fortifications are being erected. These fortifications will be ready for service in the event of a conflict with Austria. The Czar's troops are thrown into Galicia at the shortest notice. No extra force will be stationed in Galicia.

A Council of War at Vienna.

Vienna, Dec. 8.—Emperor Francis Joseph presided over a council of war at the Hofburg Palace, the Imperial Prime Minister, was also present. It was decided not to summon the delegations for the present, as Russia has not yet stopped her menacing movements. The Emperor's mobilization of the troops were arranged, which will be immediately adopted, should hostilities break out. The public is not yet excited, but it is resolved to meet any attack that may be made with firmness. In leading circles the idea that the Emperor intends to give Russia provocation for war is repudiated.

Brass and Steel Sparks at Milan's.

Milan, Dec. 8.—A riot broke out in the streets of Milan, Italy, on Monday night. The rioters were attacking the police and the military forces. The riot was suppressed after some time.

ON A BREED AND WATER DIEZ.

Mr. Mandeville Must Conform to the Rules of Tallamore Jail.

Dublin, Dec. 8.—Mr. Mandeville, who is a prisoner in Tallamore Jail, has been subjected to a breed and water diez for forty-eight hours for refusing to clean his cell.

One Month for Harrington, M.P.

Dublin, Dec. 8.—Edward Harrington, M.P., was tried in the Talbot Court today on a charge of publishing in his paper, Kerry Sentinel, the report of a meeting of the members of the National Land League. He was found guilty and sentenced to one month's imprisonment without hard labor. Notice was given of an appeal.

The Crown Prince Looks Well.

SAN REMO, Dec. 8.—The Crown Prince had the morning of Madonna Della Guardia, returning by the way of Bologna. He is now in the hospital, but he looks well. King Humbert has been a patient since the day of the Crown Prince's illness.

A British Steamer Wrecked.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The British steamer Lorne, plying in Chinese waters, was wrecked on Sunday on the east coast of the Island of Hainan. Of those on board thirty-nine were saved. The fate of the others is unknown. The Lorne was of 1070 tons burden.

A New York Village in Flames.

BINGHAMTON, Dec. 8.—A fire broke out in Great Bend village about 11 o'clock this evening, and spread rapidly, it now remains in the furnace portion of the village. The destruction of the entire business section is threatened.

THE BYLAW TOWN DOWN.

Majority of 103 Against Raising \$335,000 for the Waterworks.

City property owners were yesterday asked to vote on a bylaw to raise \$335,000 to secure the laying of an iron three-foot pipe across the Bay, and an iron five-foot pipe thence to connect with the water table pipe. The three-foot pipe is to supplement another of the same size already laid, and the five-foot pipe is to take the place of a four-foot wooden one. Several large property owners opposed to the bylaw, and the majority of the voters against it, but beyond their questionable activity no interest was manifested in the affair. The vote was a small one, the bylaw being carried by 102 on a total of 424 yeas and 586 nays. These are the returns by wards:
