The following communications were presented before proceeding with the discussion of the main business: Ald. Murray and Gowanlock moved, That in the opinion of this council persons not residing in the Province of Ontario and permanent officials should not be appointed as temporary employes of the Industrial Exhibition Association, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Industrial Exhibition Association.

Ald. Thompson was of the opinion that the council should not meddle with the Exhibition management.




