LAMBTON COUNTY COUNCIL.

Reeve Donnelly, of Alvinston Elected Warden.

Thirty-one members were elected to the Lambton County Council two weeks ago, and all but two of them were present when the session commenced at Sarnia Tuesday afternoon.

One of the absentees was detained at home on account of his illness and the other because he felt his presence would be unwelcome. The first was Mr. Brandon, of Warwick, who is ill, and the second Mr. Anderson, of Oil Springs, who no doubt feared that if he attended from Oil Springs, where there is a bad outbreak of smallpox, there would be trouble in getting a quorum in the legislative hall.

Apart from these there was a full attendance. The appearance of the council chamber, with all the members seated, was reminiscent of a few years ago before the act reducing the membership was given its unsuccessful trial. Among those present were seen several whose faces were in the county council in former years, but only one who was in last year's council. The one referred to is of course, Mr. Wm. H. McMahan, of Wyoming, who has represented Plympton for over twenty years. He was slated for defeat by some of the wise ones at the recent election, as he ran in Wyoming, where he had only recently moved. The other contentant was William Culbert, and when the votes were counted it was a tie. The clerk polled his casting vote against Mr. Culbert, with whom he was said to be on bad terms, and the result is that W. H. McMahan is again in the county council, cheerful as ever.

Four members of the present council have seen service in the county council in former days. They are: Messrs. Smith, of Moore; Neil Grant, of Somers; McNabb, of Dawn and Brandon, of Warwick.

It was a few minutes after two yesterday afternoon when clerk John Dalziel called the council to order and received the declarations of office.

The next business was the nomination of a warden.

On motion of Mr. McMahan, seconded by Mr. Cook, it was decided to take the vote by ballot.

The name of David Milne was moved by Mr. Cook, seconded by Mr. Johnston. The name of Robert G. Bailey, of Plympton, was moved by Mr. McLean, seconded by Mr. Jaap.

The name of Mr. Neil Grant, of Somers, was moved by Mr. Milne, seconded by Mr. Smith. The name of Mr. Ed. Donnelly, of Alvinston, was moved by Mr. McMahan, seconded by Mr. Darvill.

When the clerk had recorded the four nominations, it was announced that fifteen votes would have to be recorded for the successful candidate, as there were twenty-nine members present.

The first ballot showed the votes so evenly distributed that no member had the requisite fifteen.

The second and third balloting was ineffectual for the same reason.

The fourth ballot showed Grant 10, Donnelly 8, Milne 6, Bay 5.

Mr. Bailey proposed that the two lowest men should withdraw, and Mr. Milne consented.

The contest was then between Mr. Grant and Mr. Donnelly, and the counting of the votes was a moment of intense interest. The result was Grant 14, Donnelly 15; the election of Mr. Donnelly was then made unanimous.

The new warden took his seat under the escort of his mover and second, and made a brief and pleasing address, in which he thanked the members for the honor they had conferred upon him, and expressed the earnest hope that in his tenure of the office he would be able to justify their confidence in him.

Messrs. Cameron, Graham, Coyle and Nesbitt, ex-wardens, who were present, were invited within the hall, and made brief addresses.

On motion the rule was suspended to permit the appointment of auditors for the year, and Messrs. Cameron, of Enniskillen, and D. N. Sinclair, of Sarnia, were reappointed to the positions.
