OTHER BAD WRECKS.

Canadian Railway Wrecks with Many Deaths.

Some of the worst previous disasters that have occured on Canadian railways are the

THE DESJARDINES DISASTER. The terrible Designatins canal wreck occurred on March the 12th, 1857. A Great Western train from Toronto to Hamilton crashed through the bridge over the Desardines caral, near the point where the C. P. R. trains leave the Grand Trunk line at Hamilton and only a few hundred wards Hamilton, and only a few hundred yards from the junction cut, where in latter years serious wrecks occurred. The train plunged down to the frozen water below and 70 people suffered a horrible death. ST. GEORGE WRECK.

By the St. George disaster in February, 1886,, 10 people were killed and 30 injured. An iron bridge near Woodstock collapsed as the St. Louis express was passing over it, and a dining car, Pulman car and first class coach were wrecked, the dining car and first class coach falling to the ground. One of the cars took fire.

THE KOMOKA HORBOR

THE KOMOKA HORBOB.

An appalling accident occurred on the Great Western Railway (Atterward the Grand Trunk) on the train which left London for Sarnia at 6.30 p. m. on Saturday, February 28, 1874. Conductor John Mitchell still in the company's employe was in charge, with engineer George Williams in the cab. The train included, beside the engine, a baggage car, passenger coach and several oil tanks. When the train was nearing Komoka a lamp in the closet of the coach fell and the carwas soon in a blaze. The bell cord was not attached to the engine, and the cars rushed on at a full speed, the engineer being unaware of the accident. Passengers in their trenzy smashed the car windows and leaped to the ground, while others were roasted alive. On this occasion 8 lives were lost and 25 persons were injured, some very seriously, one of whom subsequently died. persons were injured, some very seriously, one of whom subsequently died. The coroner's jury found the conductor, driver, and brakeman, guilty of manslaughter, and heavy damages were secured against the company in several cases.
