To the Independent Electors of the County of Charlotte.
GENTLEMEN,
At the request of a number of the liberal and unbiased Freeholders residing in the Parishes of St. George and Penfield, I shall offer as a Candidate for your votes, at the coming General Election, and in doing so, I think it my duty, to present you with a summary of my political principles.
I profess to be a LIBERAL, yet I do not wish it understood, that I would give the majority power to deprive the rich man of his wealth, or burthen him with taxes, which he ought not to bear.
I have no hesitation in saying that the present system of raising the Revenue in New Brunswick is unfair, that it is oppressive to the poor, and therefore cannot be sound policy. I would admit free of duty, those articles consumed for the most part by the poor, and supply the deficiency in the revenue, by an increased tax on the articles known as Luxuries.
The Export Duty on Hackmatac, I believe to be a direct tax upon the tree, and is paid by the poor man who prepares it for the market.
Believing that New Brunswick, owes to every child within its limits, the opportunity of getting an education, I would advocate a school system, by which the children of the Poor, as well as the rich, could enjoy that natural right.
As a tried friend of Temperance, I would employ every honest means to advance that cause.
I would advocate a system of Government, by which the people could manage their local affairs, and thereby save much time and money, now wasted in the Provincial Assembly, and would further prevent the Representatives, from conferring favours upon their particular friends, regardless of their qualifications to discharge the duties assigned them.
I would give to the Fisheries of New Brunswick all the encouragement, due to that important branch of our industry.
I would advocate a registration of Voters and Vote by Ballot.
Should I be chosen one of your Representatives, I will serve you to the best of my ability, and when my actions fail to please a majority of my constituents, I will resign. My conduct shall be influenced by principles of justice, which I trust will prompt me to legislate fairly for all, without regard to the country of their birth, or their religious creed.
