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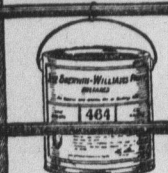

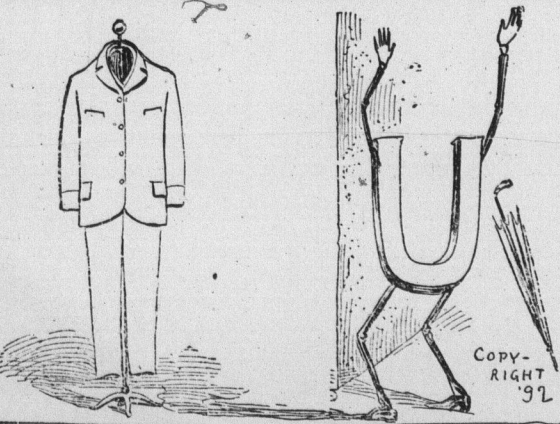

THE G. P. & H. ST. RY. CONNECTION

The project of obtaining C. P. R. connection by means of an extension of the G. P. & H. Street Railway to Berlin (and Waterloo) grows in favor with our public day by day. It realizes that valuable as the line may be for shippers, it would have other advantages of equal value to the town. To the merchants it would undoubtedly bring business, not only from the district north of Preston but from that town and Hespler as well. Those two towns pay out more money in wages according to their size, than any other couple of places in Canada and as people always like to go to a large place to trade and as there are many Germans in both, they would come to the County Town to do a considerable amount of trading. Cheap fares are promised and our merchants are enterprising enough to do the rest. In fact the News-Record believes that Berlin has more to gain from the connection than any other point on the coming system would have. To convince themselves of the excellence of the service the road can give, it would be well for the merchants to organize a party some Friday afternoon and proceed to Preston, where we feel certain the G. P. & H. people would be glad to take them over the present line and demonstrate its usefulness.

Another feature that appeals to all classes of the community is the coal question. Today Hamilton is paying only \$4.50 a ton for coal because it has competing lines. Sarnia gets its fuel cheaper than Berlin, though at a much greater distance from the Bridge because it has competition. Galt is better served and the G. T. R. at Berlin gives the manufacturer a rebate of 10 cents a ton on his coal, but not the private consumer, simply because it doesn't get freight business from the people and has no competitor. On his coal bill alone the average ratepayer would save enough to pay the tax the obtaining of the connection would cost. The line would thus benefit the citizens, the merchants and the manufacturers, and should be endorsed by all classes. Had the C.P.R. wished to come into Berlin it had the opportunity of accepting the \$80,000 voted it some years ago, but they have a settled policy not to construct branch steam lines, and if we do not avail ourselves of this opportunity of getting it, and what is equally valuable, a trolley service, the town will make a serious mistake and will have to continue to uphill work to overcome great shipping disadvantages in an endeavor to compete with more favored towns; but how successfully cannot be said, as business competition grows keener daily and it is becoming a case of the survival of the fittest. Waterloo investigated the question and endorsed the bonus. Berlin should do likewise.

BY THE WAY

The Galt dailies are engaged in a learned dispute as to which is the official paper of the county. One does the job printing and the other the advertising for the County Council. To hear them talk one would be inclined to believe that the County Council had given them the work because of some superior quality they possess over other county newspapers. But such is not the case. Their tenders for the respective works were the lowest. In fact so low that publishers up this way imagine they steal their paper and pay no wages to their printers.

The mishap to the lady cyclist while on Courtland Avenue, riding towards the Park, should lead the Board of Works to see the necessity of having the large stones raked off the road before a serious accident happens and a suit for damages follows. Of all streets those leading to the main Park should be kept in good condition.
