Hay has been selling at \$10.00 per ton in the field, but little moving now, as the year's crop is about exhausted. Expected prices will run high this fall and winter.

Butter is almost a luxury now, and good butter is a luxury. Whether the fall crop of feed is causing a scarcity of supply, or whether it is all being shipped, the fact remains that the demand is far in excess of the supply.

An important item of freight to Boston by the steamers now is the blueberry export. Last night, for instance, steamer Boston took out 331 crates. The crop in this county is reported fair, while in the New England states it is almost a failure owing to the drought. The latest returns give the price at 14 cents per quart with a firm market and an upward tendency.—Yarmouth Light.

The steamer Granville was chartered to take an excursion party from Bridgetown to Digby and return on Labor Day. About 130 people availed themselves of the opportunity to make the trip, which the fine September weather made especially enjoyable. The party picked up at Port Wade, N. R. Neely, of the St. James, being caterer. They also visited Digby and Annapolis, returning at about half past eight. The Bridgetown Band enlivened the occasion with their music.

Annapolis entertained a large crowd on Labor Day. The baseball game, the Pastime Club of Kentville vs. the Annapolis Royal team, was the feature of the sports and the closely contested game resulted in a victory for the Pastime Club of four to three. The entertainment in the Academy of Music drew a crowded house, and an interesting programme was rendered by local talent. The day was a success financially to the Band, under whose auspices the celebration was held.

Mr. John Fox, of the firm of John Fox & Co., London, Eng., has been spending the past month in Kings and Annapolis counties visiting the orchardists. He states that he finds the fruit exceptional in quality and a larger crop and 25 to 30 per cent cleaner than last year. Prospects for good prices in the English market are excellent owing to that country having but half a crop this season. Mr. Fox has had a very successful trip and is emphatically advising farmers to hold their ground and ship direct if they wish to make good profits. He believes spraying has been very efficient in producing the clean crop of the present season, and advises four consecutive sprayings for the best results.

The Daily News, of St. John's, Newfoundland, refers to the pulp, paper, lumbering and agricultural development now going on in their Colony in the following words:—"What a change! Where the lowly deer used to roam a few years ago at Busby Pond, Grand Falls, and Bishop's Falls, now it's the plough and horse and the ring of the hammer and anvil. Commission Appointed by Nova Scotia Government to Examine the Question.

The Nova Scotia Government has appointed Messrs. Walter Crowe, R. C. Sydney, P. B. McNeil, grand master P. W. A., Star Bay, to Hon. R. Brommond, editor of the "Mining Record" and W. H. Dodge, mine, Springfield, a commission to examine into and report on the feasibility of adopting some scheme providing old age pensions for workmen and such as who, either by themselves or in conjunction with their employers, establish benefit or relief societies, also to examine into and report on the organization and administration of all relief societies organized under provincial laws.

BALDWIN'S AIR SHIP

GREAT EXHIBITION ATTRACTION

Thrilling Flights from the Grounds in This Wonder of Modern Times. A Splendid Exhibition is Assured. A feature of thrilling interest at the Halifax Exhibition, which will open on September 25th, will be the daily flights of Baldwin's Air Ship. The Air Ship will rise from the Exhibition grounds and after about twenty minutes spent in circumnavigation of the City it will return to the starting place. A great cigar shaped bag, 52 feet long and 17 feet in diameter, constitutes the buoyancy-giving part of the machine. Beneath this is the wooden car, 42 feet long, in which sits Captain Baldwin, and in which is the motor that drives the twin screw propellers at a rate of 1,000 revolutions a minute. In this car also is the steering gear. The Air

Ship contains 9,000 cubic feet of hydrogen gas, to produce which 4,000 pounds of sulphuric acid and 4,000 pounds of iron turnings have been ordered to be in readiness for the arrival of the Air Ship from New York. The Exhibition itself gives every indication of being a tremendous success. The entries for Live Stock were larger on the Closing Day than ever in the past. The horses on exhibition will number 250. The horse races will attract a splendid field and the racing will continue for seven days.
