Membrane And Gives Relief.

New York .- The lives in two local hospitals have been hundreds of little liphtheria patients saved by a new HOCKEY invention, a tiny electric suction pump PLAYERS. that clears the throat of choking nembrane and allows the patient to breathe, it was learned last week. The pump is the invention of the late Dr. Henry L. Lynch. Doctors at the Kingston avenue and Willard Parker hospitals credit it with reducing their diphtheria death rate from 33 per cent, to 10 per cent. After the diphtheria membrane has been removed by the pump, a silver tube is inserted in the throat through which the patient breathes until the
