—Mr. Fitzgerald Cochrane of this town and late editor of the Prince Albert Times, has a long letter in the Times dated Silver City, May 12, and under the heading "A voice from the Rockies," he says: "The idea of imposing this duty upon the nearest land agent (Calgary) is absurd. There should be a chief commissioner of lands—including mines—for the N. W. Territories, whose headquarters would be at Calgary, with deputies for each mining district when laid off, and this chief commissioner should have the powers of a stipendiary magistrate. There are many other points of objection which I have not space in this letter to point out. The government will not modify these regulations materially unless they wish to kill the mining enterprise altogether and drive the people who would develop it out of the country altogether." Mr. Cochrane was not posted when he wrote his letter, at least in regard to the mining inspectors, who are now to be located at this point and he will have all the necessary powers.

—Before another issue of this journal will have appeared the election for the North-west Council will be over. We therefore remind our friends of Mr. Geddes to be up and doing. He is the man who has the most claims upon the electorate, and we have no doubt whatever from what we know that he will be elected by a considerable majority. Let us see one fall or turn out early and cast his vote for Mr. Geddes. His interests are inseparably bound up in those of the electorate. If he does wrong it will be against himself, and if he is elected he is entitled to the confidence of the electorate, and he is not likely to abuse it. Let the electorate show their disapprobation of a candidate who has nothing at stake and who has been put forward like an "Ass and Salley" to be knocked down for the amusement of the public.

—It is not probable that a gentleman like Mr. A. M. Burgess who is known all over as one of the most efficient Deputy Ministers in the public service is in need of any gratuitous advice given him by a newspaper which is most unfriendly to the government. The Deputy Minister has eyes and ears and the remaining organs which are necessary to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, and it is very fair that he should be allowed to judge for himself and make his own report. This he is most likely to do even at the risk of being abused by the Grit press of Manitoba. No wonder that sensible men get disgusted at the Grit party and abandon a cause which is as un-boly as it is unprincipled. While professing to be liberal it is most intolerable, while pretending to be reform it is retrogressive, and while posing as patriots it is an insidious crowd office-worship can be carried to a higher degree.
