well remarks, "Her capacity was large and forecasting, and the debt of Eugland, of Protestantism, and of humanity, to her character and reign, is incalculable. Without her help, limited and hesitating as it often was, Scotland could not have asserted her independence of France; and the Dutch could not have asserted their independence of Spain; which is in effect to say that Europe could not have been free. The great reaction of Romanism began with her accession, and her policy may be said to have crushed its revived energy, and to have fixed it within limits which it has not since been able to pass."\*
