He was elected to the House of Commons in 1857, and was re-elected in 1862, 1867, 1871, 1873, and 1877. He was appointed to the office of Minister of Marine and Fisheries in 1873, and held that position until 1877.

BEHRINGS SEA.

A Fresh Letter from Mr. Blaine.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—The following note, in addition to the correspondence that has already passed in relation to the Behring Sea controversy, is made public.

(Mr. Blaine to Sir Julian Pauncefote.) DEPARTMENT OF STATE, WASHINGTON, April 11, 1891.

SIR.—The modifications which Lord Salisbury suggests in the questions for arbitration, do not wholly meet the views of the President, and the President suggests a different course in such manner, it is hoped, as will result in an agreement between the two Governments. While Lord Salisbury suggests a different mode of procedure from that embodied in the sixth question, the President does not understand him actually to object to the question, and he, therefore, assumes that it is agreed to.
