

tion to which you have been appointed to make your selection in the first instance in such a way that the numbers of those who will be unable to pass the test will be as small as possible.

Residence of enumerators.—To ensure the best results each enumerator appointed should, as far as practicable, be an actual resident of the sub-division within which his duties are to be performed. This ensures familiarity with the territory and the general character of the people residing in the district he is to canvass. Only in cases where a competent resident of an enumeration area cannot be found should a selection be made of a person living elsewhere. An enumerator should be thoroughly familiar with the boundaries of the various units which are contained within the area assigned to him.

Qualifications of enumerators.—The enumerators should be active, energetic persons of good address, as outlined in Section 35 of the Book of Instructions.

The following classes of persons are suggested as likely to make good enumerators, and they are specially recommended to your favourable consideration:—(a) In rural districts, crop correspondents of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics; (b) School teachers when available and able to give their time to the work; (c) Officers and leading workers in farmers' organizations, live stock associations, co-operative creameries, etc.; progressive farmers and their sons and daughters; and especially young men or women who have attended agricultural colleges or agricultural experimental stations.

It is further suggested that, in certain sections, women would make excellent appointments as census enumerators owing to the fact that in many instances the information must be obtained from the female head of the house. In the last census several women acted as enumerators and gave excellent results.

Enumerators must give their entire time to census work.—It is absolutely essential that applicants for the position of enumerator should understand that their whole working time will be required during the period of enumeration. It will be impossible for an enumerator to complete his district in the allotted time if he undertakes to carry on at the same time any work or business.
