PROPOSED AGRICULTURE ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM

Question No. 1,682—**Mr. Mazankowski:**

1. Have any meetings been held by the Minister of Agriculture or his officials with groups interested in the proposed Agriculture Adjustment Program and, if so (a) how many were held (b) on what dates (c) at what locations (d) what were the names of the participating organizations?

2. In each case, were alternative programs proposed and, if so, does the government intend to bring in legislation to cover these proposals and, if so, by what date?

Hon. H. A. Olson (Minister of Agriculture): 1. Two meetings took place between the Minister of Agriculture and the provincial ministers of agriculture, one on March 26, 1971, at Ottawa, and one on July 21, 1971, at Edmonton. The Minister of Agriculture met with the representatives of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture and the National Farmers' Union on April 21, 1971, in Ottawa. Officials met with representatives of the provincial departments of agriculture on April 14 and 15, in Ottawa, and with the provincial deputy ministers of agriculture on April 28 in Ottawa.

2. At meetings with members of the provincial departments of agriculture alternative methods for the administration of the program proposed by the federal Government were put forward, together with changes in the program details. Decisions concerning legislation will be announced in the usual manner.

NEWCASTLE DISEASE IN POULTRY FLOCKS

Question No. 1,700—**Mr. McCutcheon:**

Has Newcastle disease been discovered in poultry flocks in Southern Ontario and, if so (a) on what date (b) in what municipality (c) what remuneration has been paid to producers whose birds have been destroyed in clean-up attempts?

Hon. H. A. Olson (Minister of Agriculture): Yes, Newcastle disease has been diagnosed in eight poultry flocks in the Chatham area of Southern Ontario. (a) The first diagnosis was made on July 30, 1971, in a flock located in the Township of Orford, Kent County. (b) The initial outbreak spread to five additional premises in Orford township, Kent County; to one premises in Chatham township, Kent County, and to one premises in Mosa township, Middlesex County. (c) Compensation in the amount of \$15,885.66 has

been awarded to the owners of poultry flocks which had to be ordered destroyed as a disease eradication measure.

Hill, Ontario; Mr. Jack A. Ferguson, Ontario; Mr. J.A. McCallister, Manitoba; Mr. E.A. Boden, Saskatchewan; Mr. L.R. Stephens, British Columbia; Mr. D.J. McKinnon, Alberta.

2. 1968-69, two meetings; 1969-70, two meetings; 1970-71, two meetings.

3. 1968-69: Eggs, poultry, potatoes, oilseeds, corn, dairy and hogs. 1969-70: Dairy, eggs, oilseeds, sugar beets, and marketing legislation. 1970-71: Dairy, eggs, poultry, hogs, wool, apples, potatoes, sugar beets and grains.

Question No. 1,371—**Mr. Coates:**

1. How many members of the Public Service of Canada are now involved in courses in bilingualism and, of this number, how many are involved in courses teaching (a) the French language (b) the English language?

2. Of the total number involved in bilingual training (a) how many are receiving these courses outside their regular working hours (b) how many are involved in courses that require the use of part of their normal working hours (c) how many are involved in courses that require that they remove themselves from their normal employment for a period of time?

3. Of the total number who are involved in linguistic training for part of each work week, what method is used to replace the man-hours given over to linguistic training?

4. How many public servants have now been involved in linguistic training that removed them completely from their ordinary employment and, for the fiscal year 1970-71, what was the total number of man-hours involved in this type of training?
