FRANCE'S WAR OUTLAY
HUGE IN PROPORTIONS
More Than Billion and Quarter for First Four Months.

PARIS, July 29.—The first five months of the great war cost France exactly 6,468,000,000 francs (\$1,280,000,000). This is shown by the report of the budget committee on supplementary military and naval credits, just issued.

The chamber of deputies today raised the limit of the issue of defence bonds to seven billion francs (\$1,400,000,000).

The lower house also appropriated 4,500,000 francs (\$900,000) for the relief of the population of the French districts invaded by Germans.

The amount of gold exchanged for paper by the Bank of France since May 27 of this year totals 220,000,000 francs (\$44,000,000).

THREE MEN CHARGED WITH SHOPLIFTING

Went Out to See What They Could Get—Know Today.

BODY OF CHILD FOUND
Manhole Discloses Gruesome Find and Inquest is Ordered.

George Smith, 22 Inkerman street; Thomas Brewster, 350 Keweenaw avenue; and Joseph Lovinger, Minto avenue, were arrested by Detective Guthrie, John and LeVitt yesterday afternoon, charged with shoplifting in the Simpson and Knox stores.

The trio, who are stone cutters by trade, stated that they went out to see how much they could get, and just what they will get will be determined when they appear in police court this morning. When arrested they had ties, shoes, goggles, gold paint and several souvenir plates in their possession.

Found in Manhole.
The body of a child was found yesterday afternoon in a manhole at the corner of Olive and Palmerston avenues. It was removed to the morgue, where an inquest will be opened today.

George Honnigwell, 178 Baldwin street, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Detective Koster, on a charge of theft of a suit of clothes from William H. Arnold, 110 Carlton street.

Detective Guthrie arrested Jessie Marritt yesterday afternoon on a charge of shoplifting in Simpson's.

Murder Charge Dropped.
Following the verdict of the coroner's jury at the morgue Wednesday night, William Smith, a Greek, who was held by the police on a charge of manslaughter, was dismissed by Magistrate Kingsford in the police court yesterday morning.

Smith was being held in connection with the death of a young woman, the little boy who fell into a pit of scalding water, while Smith and others were working at the rear of a restaurant at West Toronto.

Robert Thompson was committed for trial by Magistrate Kingsford yesterday morning on a charge of obtaining \$100 by fraud from Dr. Burr. Dr. Burr stated that he met Thompson, who had the old story that the "halloa" was going over for sure that day. Burr gave Thompson \$100 to bet on the horse and Thompson took the money and said he was going to lay the bet with Abe Orpen. The doctor also stated that he later found out that the race had been run and that the horse lost before the wager had been put up. Mr. Orpen was asked by the crown if he had accepted the bet, and Orpen denied having taken it, and said that there were several people going around taking bets, saying that they were working for him.

Penitentiary Sentences.
John Raines and Fred Walsh, whom Crown Attorney Corley described as dangerous men, were sentenced to two years each in the Kingston Penitentiary. They were charged with stealing \$14 from a watchman at Thomas Barton, a stranger from the west.

Liquor Charge Failed.
Magistrate Kingsford dismissed the charge of selling liquor off a wagon against Thomas Barnes, a Queen street liquor man. The police told of the sale and said that on the day the collection and he had not seen him since.

Committed for Trial.
William Ed Henry Hines and James Todd were committed for trial by Magistrate Kingsford in the police court yesterday morning. The trio were charged with stealing a watch from the Canadian Express Company of Toronto of between \$10 and \$20 a week, and the total of their defalcations reached the sum of \$2300.

The accused was granted bail.

While helping to put in a new press at an office on Adelaide street yesterday afternoon, John Angelo, an Italian, fell from a scaffold and was badly injured. Angelo was stooping over and a barrel fell on him. He was removed in an unconscious condition to the General Hospital. Later in the evening he regained consciousness and was taken to his home.
