AURDER CHARGE LAID

Thomas Griffiths Struck Orlande Arnold During Quarrel, Latter Succumbing to Injuries.

CHATHAM. Sept. 28 .- (Special.) -Thomas Griffith of Chatham Township was arrested at noon to-day, charged with the killing of Orlando Arnold. He was remanded pending the verdict of into the death of Arnold.

W. R. JOHNSTON PASSES

One of the most highly respected men in Toronto, William Robert Johnston, passed away last night at midnight. About two years ago Mr. Johnston contracted bronchitls, which became chronic, and last Friday developed into pneumonic, from which he died. Little hope of his recovery had been given by the doctors the last two or three days.

The deceased was known as one of the most successful merchants in Canada, the business of which he was president baring been commenced here. the most successful merchants in Canada, the business of which he was president having been commenced here 45 years ago. Mr. Johnston was born in the little Village of Iroquois. Ont., in 1841. When a young man he went to Montreal, taking employment with the firm of Henry Morgan & Co. At the age of 26 he came to Toronto, and with L. M. Livingstone established the business of Livingstone. Johnston & Co., which was continued for 18 years. After that with two of his sons, and Herbari Langlois and J. T. Black, he formed the business of W. R. Johnston & Co., which a little later was changed to W. R. Johnston & Co., Limited.

Mr. Johnston was president of the company, but the last two or three years he took little part in its control, the business being managed by his sons. William Robert and Alfred Johnston, and under their executive it will probably remain.

Mr. Johnston was known in Toronto as a most enthusiastic horseman, he being a member of the Toronto Hunt. He was also, until late years a very active member of the Toronto Golf. Cibb. as well as the Toronto Cibi.

Offer Economic Concessions.

The note continues:

"The royal government has received from its consular agents in Tripoil and Cyrene information that the situation is extremely grave because of the agitation prevailing against Italian subjects and which is incited in evident fashion by officers and other functionaries of authority.

Composite Rail is Needed.

Mr. Clarke of the Cleveland Street Railway Company, said he thought it would be impossible to roll and operate a composite rail to completely suit the requirments of the case, and in this he was supported by the Metropolitan Company's expert.
