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WAS MARRIED FOR MONEY AND SHAMEFULLY ABUSED

Miserable Life of the Countess of Castellane is Related in Divorce Court.

Paris, Oct. 31.—The Castellane divorce case was heard this afternoon before M. Henry Witte, president of the tribunal of first instance of the Seine. Neither the count nor the countess was present.

The extended review, counsel declared that the countess, at the beginning of the suit, was not acting under influence, but solely for the purpose of ending forever the peril of the moral desecration of her household.

When he reached the question of the infidelity charged against the count, Maitre Cruppi did not mention names, or even initials, designating the co-respondents as "Madame A.," "Madame B.," and so on.

Even in spite of their domestic infidelity, the countess was too good and scrupulous to begin an action for divorce until she possessed full proof. She was only 20 when she was married in 1895, and Maitre Cruppi asserted, the happiness of the honeymoon was disturbed on their arrival in Paris by the count's demands for money.

Count a Spender. By 1899 the countess' interests were so heavily compromised by the count's extravagance that it necessitated a family meeting in New York and the appointment of a legal trustee.

Warrant for Montrealer Who Posed as Having Been Lett a Fortuna. Montreal, Oct. 31.—M. Cremer, who posed as heir to a fortune of half a million, and which was on its way from Germany, has confessed to the fraud, and a warrant was issued to-day.

He managed to get money advanced him and purchased real estate and personal property to the value of 20,000. For the past week he has been selling the best horses and rigs in the city, with footmen and groom in elaborate livery.

He bought 3500 worth of jewelry for young lady, paid 1200 for clothes, 2000 for horses, and 2700 for harness. He confessed the fraud, but still insists he has a large estate in Germany. He has lived here for ten years, and was well known as a steady maid.

CHAIR OF PEDAGOGY. Conference Held of Parties Interested, But Little is Done. A conference of the government, the university and the board of education was held in the parliament buildings yesterday afternoon in connection with the evidence submitted by Maitre Cruppi.

Maitre Cruppi stated that the count's defence would probably be that, being young and rich, he could not protect himself against the assaults of love-sick women. In the face of the overwhelming evidence against Maitre Cruppi, his opponent could not expect the tribunal to ask for the summing-up of witnesses.

Maitre Cruppi did not finish his presentation of the case when the hearing was adjourned until next week. Counsel placed at \$8,000,000 the count's expenditures submitted, the pointment of a trustee, and the seizure of their property in a suit for the recovery of a debt amounting to \$229,500.

BALM FOR BROKEN HEART. Jury Awards \$1000 Damages in Breach of Promise Suit. It is high on to 11 years since Elizabeth Follis, whose home is near Palmerston, Ont., met George W. Wilson. Friendship developed a promise of marriage. That is the reason of the \$1000 damage suit, Justice Magee and a jury heard yesterday.

For a number of years, about five, Miss Follis considered herself, on the invitation of Wilson, the bride-to-be. He gave her an engagement ring, shoes, a bicycle and many other articles of affection. But, alas, an iceberg ran over his love, and he grew cold and negligent, and there were no wedding bells for her.

Arrested After Four Years. Young Woman in Custody on a Charge of Manslaughter. In September, 1902, a coroner's jury brought in a verdict of manslaughter against Elizabeth Johnston, who was then 17 years of age. She was accused of falling to provide the necessary assistance to an infant at child birth.

The young woman left the city, returned three weeks ago and was yesterday arrested by Detective Newton. The young woman's mother says her daughter went away on the advice of the physician who attended her and that the premature birth was due to a shock, and that the neglect, if any, was unavoidable.
