

One of the provisions of the proposed new Game Act is that no resident of the province, with the exception of farmers and farmers' sons on their own farms or in the immediate neighborhood of such, is permitted to use a gun or rifle, without paying either the present big game license a gun ilcense fee of \$1. This provision of course does not apply to rifles carried by the military or used

advantage in the direction of better protection, especially of bird life. There is no doubt that many foreign ers, especially Italians, and also young boys use fire arms to kill both song and insectivorous birds, and that where a gun license fee is charged much of this will stop. On the other hand, there may be many who have been so long accustomed to carrying rifles and shot guns freely that considerable opposition may be shown. It must not be lost sight of, however, that the act provides that the money derived from the \$1 fee form a specia fund to be expended entirely in the interests of fish and game protection.
