February, 1820. He was the namesake and second son of the late Sir John Beverley Robinson, baronet, and Chief Justice of Upper Canada. Mr. Robinson was instructed in the primary branches by private tuition, and atterwards completed his course of studies at Upper Canada College. He was one of the earliest students that attended this institution, and had as a preceptor the distinguished scholar and master, the Rev. J. H. Harris. A love of manly sports and a splendid physique characterized the popular and level-headed Upper Canadas student; and, as another writer has remarked, these qualities have accompanied him through life.
