Montreal Capitalists and Bankers are tendering for a Large Slice of the New Canadian Loan.

Montreal, Oct. 14.—(Special.)—"Three cheers for Canada!" This is what the capitalists of Montreal say to-day when the opening of tenders for the new ten-million Canadian loan will reveal the fact that tenders for fully one-third of the whole will be from Montreal. It was announced at 2.30 p.m. that the investigation proved that Mayor Wilson Smith, the Bank of Montreal and several other institutions had clubbed together and called a tender for over \$3,000,000 of the loan. Whether the Canadian Finance Minister allows a portion of the loan to be commercial banks but the fact remains that Canada has outstripped all other men who have confidence in their country.

HER HEAD FULL OF TOPICS. A DESPERATE AFFRAY.

Miss Frances E. Willard Has Her Speech for the World's W. C. T. U. All Prepared.

New York, Oct. 14.—Miss Frances E. Willard will address the delegates of the World's Women's Christian Temperance Union on Oct. 23, in Toronto, and the delegates of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union in Buffalo on Oct. 29. These addresses will appear in separate pamphlets. They include 75 topics. The following are some of the salient points to be dealt with by Miss Willard: Total prohibition by law, by politics and by woman's ballot; total prohibition of any form of gambling, whether public or private, on the race track or in the parlors; the United States of the fifty Presidents of States and Territories, twenty-nine superintendents, twenty-nine organizers and lecturers, the press department, she states, has never made such progress as in the present year, and every movement, caused, excited, and sustained, especially in the metropolitan districts as manifesting an interest in the work. The labor question, she declares that: "We believe in a living wage; in an eight-hour day; in courts of conciliation and arbitration; in justice, as opposed to greed of gain."

Miss Willard talks of our "patriot politics and contrast the success of a house in Cambridge, Mass., a city of 85,000 inhabitants, which was more serious in the past, and the banquets where wine is furnished in that goodly Presbyterian stronghold."

SIX MONTHS FOR GRENIER For Labeling the Minister of Public Works.

SEVERITY OF THE SENTENCE Has Caused an Outburst of Sympathy for the Editor.

In Addition, Mr. Grenier is to be Bound Over to Keep the Peace and Conduct Himself Well for Two Years, and Failing to do so to End His Term—Much Comment Over the Case—Political and Other Notes From Montreal.

Montreal, Oct. 14.—(Special.)—W. A. Grenier went down to jail to-day to serve out a sentence of six months, and forcing this morning by Judge Wurtelle. No one expected so long a term, and the severity of the sentence. His Honor first refused Mr. Cornellier's application for an arrest of judgment, so as to permit the demand for the Attorney-General's warrant to take the case to appeal.

In pronouncing sentence, Judge Wurtelle said Grenier had not justified his honor for Grenier, but a man who would hold the honor, reputation and dignity of a Minister of the Crown should be punished. Had the charges been proven, and had he not been a Minister of the Crown, he would have suffered in the eyes of his countrymen, and Canada would have suffered in the eyes of the world. He cited the cases of Lafontaine and Laurier, and said that he would give Grenier six months in the common jail, without hard labor. His Honor declared that at the expiration of the six months the defendant must furnish personal and other security for \$1000 to keep the peace and good conduct for two years, and, failing to furnish the security, he must continue in jail for twelve months longer.

Grenier was then taken to jail.

The news soon spread around town and the sentence was soon the topic of conversation at the hotels. Without a single exception, Liberal and Conservative alike, were most severe in their comments.
