THE CATTLE MARKET.

In considering the proposal to remove the cattle market, it becomes pertinent to ascertain who the individuals and what the interests are that favor its removal. It will be more convenient to answer this question in a negative way by specifying the interests that are opposed to the removal of the market. First of all the cattle dealers are raising no objection to the present site. The World's market reporter has made a canvass of the men and firms that do business at the market and he finds them nearly unanimous in their approval of the present site. Many of them would not object if improvements were made to the market, or if it were enlarged, but they are not interested in its removal. The railways do not desire a change in the site of the market. This is true, at least, of the Grand Trunk Railway, which brings 75 per cent of the cattle and hogs into the market. So strongly against the proposed change that it threatens to open a market of its own in the event of a removal being decided on. The C.P.R. has not complained of the present site. We have heard of no requisition from the buyers of the city asking for or suggesting the removal of the market. We know further that the pork packing firms which buy extensively from the market are strongly opposed to a change of location. The William Davies Company, which is situated two miles from the market, desires no change. Messrs. Park, Blackwell & Co., who have just erected a large packing factory in the immediate vicinity of the market, did so in the belief that the market would not be removed, and they therefore are as strongly opposed to the removal as they can be. Only a short time ago Mr. Harris erected an abattoir contiguous to the market. He too, is strenuously opposed to the proposition for securing a new site. Everyone in fact who is directly interested in the market and who has business there is opposed to the scheme of removal.

Having specified the firms that are opposed to the removal, it is not difficult to locate the individuals who are clamoring so loudly for a change. When the thing is sifted down it is found that these individuals have little or no interest in the market. They have market sites for sale. It is for this reason that they are so interested in the removal. Next to the property owners the most interested individuals are certain of the aldermen who agree with the former in their contention that the best thing that could happen the city would be a change of location.

A certain newspaper that devotes a great deal of its space to the exploitation of schemes of this kind also shouts on the side of the property owners. These, so far as we can see, are the only individuals who are clamoring for a new cattle market. The agitation, in short, seems to be a scheme for unloading property on the city, for which a sale could not otherwise be made. That is at the bottom of the agitation.

The rumor that the Armour Co. of Chicago would come to Toronto and establish a packing factory here if the site were changed is merely put up to serve the ends of the schemers. No one has been able to trace this rumor to a reliable source. If Mr. Armour thinks it would be advisable to open a factory in Toronto, the location of the cattle market would make very little difference with his decision. There are plenty of factory sites, which he could obtain equally as convenient as those which are now occupied by different pork packing concerns. Even if we accept the theory that the Armour Co. is contemplating coming to Toronto, and that it would prefer a new site for the market is there any reason why we should accommodate this single firm, when we would greatly

convenience the several large firms that are now engaged in the business? In every way the removal is looked at it is inadvisable to countenance it. All that is required is to remodel the present market, increase its area by taking in Stanley Park and manage it properly. Conducted in this way the market is large enough for all the business that we will have for the next five or ten years.

THE CUBAN DEBT.

The stumbling block that prevents a speedy settlement of the dispute before the Peace Commission in Paris is the so-called Cuban debt. The Spanish members of the commission take the view that the United States must expect to assume the burdens as well as enjoy the benefits of sovereignty. They argue that the United States will sooner or later accept the sovereignty of the island, and that it should therefore be made responsible for the payment of 400 million dollars of Spanish bonds, which are commonly referred to as the Cuban debt. They further contend that it is a recognized principle of international law, that a conqueror on becoming possessed of a country receives it subject to all engagements of the pre-existing Government towards others. For these reasons Spain claims that the United States should assume the obligations of Cuba to third parties.

By way of answer to the reasoning of the Spaniards, the American Commissioners insist, in the first place, that there is no Cuban debt, but that the obligation which goes by that name is in fact a debt contracted by Spain not for the benefit of Cuba, but for the purpose of providing ways and means to forcibly keep the island in subjection. A part of this misnamed debt consists, it is said, of bonds sold by Spain in aid of her wars in Morocco and in the Philippines. The second answer of the American Commissioners to the Spanish contention is that the United States did not intend at the outset of the war to annex Cuba, have no present intention of doing so, and will not agree to accept from Spain a transfer of her sovereignty over the island. Cuba's present status, it is claimed, is that of a temporary protectorate pending the formation of an independent government, after which the protectorate will be withdrawn. These are the arguments. It matters little which side is technically or legally correct, as it seems pretty clear that the United States Commissioners will not agree to assume the debt.

A NOVEL TELEPHONE SERVICE.

It is some few months, if not a year or two, since a great scientific discovery has been sprung upon the public. The electric car, the graphophone, the cinematograph, although all of recent date, have lost their novelty. Something new and curious is now in order. It is just possible that what is known as the "News and Entertainment Telephone" will come to the front in a very short time and satisfy this popular craving. The News and Entertainment telephone is more than an experiment. It has been tried and found to be immensely popular. The Strand Magazine states that the new telephone is to be brought to London, and at the present moment arrangements are being made for its installation in the Metropolis. A peculiarity of this telephone system is that the subscriber cannot communicate with the central office or with any other subscriber. It is simply a mechanical contrivance whereby the central office can communicate simultaneously with everyone on the list. One man with a clear voice can make himself audible to an almost unlimited number of subscribers. It is said that some individual could talk at the same time to every inhabitant of the City of London and make himself distinctly heard. The simplicity of the system makes it surprisingly inexpensive. There is no expensive switch board mechanism to construct and no army of hello girls to retain. Once the wire is laid between a house and the central office the expense is virtually ended. The charge in Buda-Pesth for the service is only a penny a day, or 30 fillings a year.

Let us see now what a subscriber can obtain for his penny. He has a time table of the various items which will be telephoned during the day. This time table in Buda-Pesth is arranged something like this: At half past eight the subscriber is given the substance of the principal telegrams received during the night. Later on comes the news of the capital with a program of the day's events. At 9 o'clock the official news of the city is given. A little later follows a concise review of the principal papers with the substance of the leading articles, and news reports of the opening of the stock and corn exchanges. Following this come the local news, theatrical, art and science notices and a little daily thought and regard for health.
