BOER DELEGATES MAY RETURN

Acknowledgment by Kruger of British Sovereignty Waived.

London, June 6.—The organ of Colonial Secretary Chamberlain, The Birmingham Post, says today that, on account of his age and infirmities, the British government has waived its claim for the acknowledgment by Mr. Kruger of British sovereignty over the Transvaal, and has guaranteed to all the Boer delegates in Europe a safe conduct to their homes in South Africa.

Independent Forestry.

A cable has been received at the Temple Building, announcing the arrival of Doctor Ormbyhatchka, the Supreme Chief Ranger, in England, where he will devote some weeks to the furtherance of the Order's interests in Europe.

The Supreme Chief has issued a special circular, calling upon the membership the world over to observe Sunday, June 22, which marks the Order's 28th anniversary, as a special day of thanksgiving, and they are to assemble themselves that day in some place of worship, to return thanks to Almighty God for His many mercies, and to pray for the continuance of His great kindness.

The membership, on May 1, stood at 290,131, and the surplus on June 1, \$5,325,411.78. A special campaign has been inaugurated for the months of June, July and August by the Supreme Executive, and large accessions to the Order's membership are looked for in these months.

FINANCES IN GOOD SHAPE.

Britain's Credit Unimpaired Even After a Costly War.

London, June 6.—Prior to the second reading of the loan bill in the House of Lords, today, Lord Goschen (Liberal), and a former Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced that he desired to say a few words on the financial position of the country. Consols, which were now paying only 2-1/2 per cent, stood at 97. Before the conversion of 1888, 3-per-cent consols stood at 101. If they had been converted then, they would have been worth only \$2, so that now the stock was really 10 per cent higher, and that after a costly war, and the borrowing of £150,000,000 (\$750,000,000). The country might well congratulate itself on a situation which showed such economic stamina he said.

The Premier, Lord Salisbury, said such words, coming from such a high authority, were very gratifying and would be widely read.

WILL FIGHT THE INDICTMENT

Works Committee Discusses the Situation in Regard to Dundas and Yonge-St. Pavements.

WILL APPLY FOR LEGISLATION

To Compel Property Owners to Have Proper Pavements—Notes From the City Hall.

The indictment against the city in regard to the condition of Dundas-street and Yonge-street pavements was discussed by the Works Committee yesterday afternoon, after some private correspondence had been read in connection with it.

Ald. Lamb moved that the city seek legislation to enable the Council, on a two-thirds majority, to order pavements to be laid where the Engineer said it was necessary, whether the property owners desire it or not. Ald. Curry was strongly opposed to it, but he was the only dissenter. He did not believe in compelling anyone to pay for local improvements if he did not want them.

Ald. Hubbard suggested that the track allowance should be paved, in any event, on both streets. He thought the city had done all it could legally do when it had twice recommended that the pavement be laid under the Local Improvement Act. It was not the city's fault that the roads were in such bad shape. The property owners were the parties upon whom to fix the blame.

Ald. Curry criticized very warmly the Local Improvement Act. He said it was all wrong, and an injustice to the people who owned property. He said, further, that both the streets under discussion were main arteries to the city. They were used by hundreds of farmers, and he was strongly of the opinion that it would be very unfair to compel the people who own the property to build a road, if they did not want it.

The City Solicitor was instructed to defend the city's position, in connection with the indictment.

Sewage Disposal.—The committee authorized the City Engineer to recommend a separate sewage disposal system for the city east of Woodbine-avenue, at a cost of \$40,000. The system will utilize septic tanks.

Will Renumber Houses.—Ald. Fleming says that every citizen has a right to a high class house. The question arose, because there is a duplication of house numbers on the north side of College-street, from Yonge to Elizabeth-street, which causes considerable annoyance to some of the residents.

Someone from the Engineer's Department interviewed the householders, and found that they objected to any change; but, as houses are being erected, which can have no numbers unless a change is made, it is looked on as a public necessity, and the Engineer was authorized to go on with the work of changing the numbers.

That Asphalt Plant.—The Engineer's recommendation in regard to the purchase of an asphalt plant was referred back to him for further information as to the workings of municipal asphalt plants elsewhere, and the kind of asphalt they use. The Engineer reported that the city could save 10 per cent on the cost of pavements, with a municipal plant.

After the Company.—As the Toronto Railway Company has shown no disposition to extend the street car tracks on Parliament-street, north of Wellington-street, the matter was referred to the City Solicitor, with instructions to take immediate action to compel the company to carry the work to completion.

Asphalt for Dufferin-St.—The City Engineer will report on Ald. Foster's suggestion, that an asphalt pavement and concrete sidewalk be laid on Dufferin-street, between the Exhibition Grounds. He wants the work done right away.

Rough on the Watters.—The first at the Pavilion was mentioned by Ald. Foster, who said there had been a lamentable lack of fire protection, because of the insufficient water power. He had been informed that the same condition of affairs existed at the Exhibition Grounds, and now was the time to remedy it. Ald. Hubbard said that Ald. Foster had been mistaken, and that there was plenty of water at the Exhibition. The fire was discussed, but followed by the caretaker of the Pavilion. "Any caretaker who would leave his building at such an hour in the front of a lot of watters, who, by that time, would naturally be pretty full, should be retired," said the alderman, and Ald. Hubbard agreed with him.

Garbage Collection.—Garbage collection was discussed yesterday afternoon by a sub-committee of the Works Committee, and several communications from other cities were read, and showed that Toronto was collecting garbage cheaper and better than any other city of a similar size. Rochester pays \$20,000 under contract for removal of garbage, and in addition, that city spends between \$70,000 and \$80,000 a year removing ashes and dry rubbish. The total cost in Toronto is only about \$25,000 a year. Ashes are collected from a number of factories in Toronto, contrary to the bylaw. About 40,000 loads a year are collected here above what is provided for by bylaw. Street Commissioner Jones stated that a number of manufacturers were anxious to pay for the city removing the garbage from their factories, but the

bylaw is so framed that the city can't do this. The Street Commissioner will bring in a report as to the changes necessary in the bylaw, and at the next meeting of the committee, representatives of the manufacturers will be invited to attend and express some views.

City Chamber Sessions.—Alone and vexed, Ald. McMurrich sat in the Board of Control room for 15 minutes yesterday afternoon waiting for a meeting of the board, which he had been summoned to attend at 2 p.m. He was about to depart when Secretary McQueen came along and informed the controller that the board was meeting in private in the Mayor's office. The controller made a few hasty remarks, but followed the secretary to the "quiet smoke" department. At this meeting, the Exhibition buildings were discussed, and satisfactory reports of progress were received from the architects, with one exception.

The Island Committee failed to get a quorum again yesterday afternoon. Ald. Curry and Ward and Mr. McNaught turned up, but Chairman Burns failed to materialize, also he authorized the secretary to call a meeting. The question of removing cameras from Hamilton's Point is to be further dealt with.

Mayor Davis of Windsor called on Engineer Rust at the Works Committee yesterday, to get some information in regard to pavements.

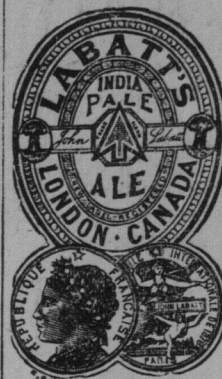
