STUDENTS SORE ON POLICE

Give Evidence Before Commission Supporting Charges of Cruelty and Recklessness.

SERGEANT GOULDING'S TESTIMONY
Was Hit in the Neck With a Stone Before the Charge Was Ordered.

The treatment of college students by the police on the night of the riot was the subject of an extended investigation by a commission of the Board of Police Commissioners yesterday.

TARTE TURNS PHILOSOPHER

Declares That Liberal Party Has Been Divided Into Two Cliques Since 1896.

REPROACHES NONE FOR SITUATION
But Admits That His Enemies Have Taken Place Vacated by Him.

Montreal, Nov. 11.—Hon. Mr. Tarte discussing the cabinet changes at Ottawa says: "There have been two currents of ideas and influences in the Liberal party since 1896. Mr. Tarte and the group which supported him represented one of these currents, while Mr. Prefontaine and others represented the other school. However, Mr. Tarte does not think of reproaching any one today for what is done. The present combination, made by the Prime Minister after deep reflection, is the result of a long series of circumstances which have for some time past convinced Mr. Tarte that he should not remain a member of the administration. The ex-Minister of Public Works has often been attacked by Mr. Prefontaine by Le Soleil and other papers. Our friends of the Herald remained silent and indifferent, while The Witness went far to praise Mr. Tarte or his worth. The inevitable happened, and Mr. Tarte decided to get out. He did not leave, and Mr. Prefontaine and others. Mr. Tarte had taken his place. But for all this we do not anticipate that the end of the world will come."

CANADA NEEDS IMMIGRANTS.

Expect a Hundred Thousand Next Year in Western Provinces.

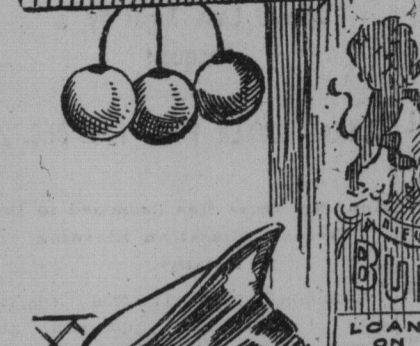
London, Nov. 11.—The Canadian Emigration Office in London, which was recently promoted to the dignity of a special bureau, with a commissioner of its own, is preparing to branch out on an extensive scale, with the view of popularizing emigration to the Northwest. Two floors have been secured in a new building, going up at Charing Cross, in the East of the railroad and steamship offices. Contracts have been placed for fitting up the office exclusively with Canadian woodwork, office furniture and a steam heating plant. It will contain a complete exhibit of Canadian produce.

GIRLS SOLD AT HONG KONG.

Secret Slave Trade Revived With Canton and Distant Provinces.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 11.—Hong Kong advices state that there is a great revival in the slave trade in girls between Hong Kong, Canton and distant provinces. Hundreds of girls, chiefly of tender years, are known to be living in slavery in Hong Kong. The trade is carried on so secretly that it is doubtful if it can be broken up. In the secret markets of the slave trade girls are said to be bought and sold daily.

NORTH GREY IS NOW VACANT

Alexander G. McKay, Liberal, Admits Enough Charges to Void His Election.

PREMIER ROSS HAS TWO MAJORITY
There Are Still Eight Election Petitions, Five Against Conservatives, Three Against Liberals.

Liberal Majority—Two.
Seats vacant—North Grey, North Perth, North Norfolk, North Grenville.

Petitions Not Disposed of.
Liberal seats—East Middlesex, North York, Kingston—3.
Conservative seats—South Oxford, Lennox, Centre Bruce, South St. Marie, North Ontario—5.

Owen Sound, Nov. 11.—Justices MacMahon and Macleanman today voided the election of A. G. McKay, Liberal candidate in North Grey, and the seat is now vacant. This will leave Premier Ross with a majority of two, with four seats open—North Grey, North Perth, North Norfolk and North Grenville.

FREE AFTER 4 YEARS IN JAIL

Roland B. Molineux Set at Liberty After Jury Was Out Thirteen Minutes.

VERDICT CONFIDENTLY EXPECTED
Aged Father Deeply Affected, But Acquitted Man Accepted Situation Calmly.

New York, Nov. 11.—Roland B. Molineux was set at liberty today after spending nearly four years in prison and being once condemned to death and twice placed on trial for his life for the murder of Mrs. Katherine J. Adams by sending poison thru the mails.

CLAIMS FOR DAMAGES.

Outside in the corridor a large crowd had assembled in the hope of hearing the evidence of the boys. Among those present were several members of the Retail Merchants' Association, with claims for damage against the city for property destroyed by the riot.

LEFT FOR CHINESE MISSION.

Father Fraser Is First Canadian Priest Called to This Field.

Father Fraser of Leslieville left the city yesterday for the Chinese mission, to which he has been appointed by the Propaganda. He is the first Canadian priest to be called to the Chinese field, probably the first English-speaking priest.

STRANDED ON THE ROCKS.

Heavy Snowstorm Prevailed on Lake Superior Yesterday.

Port Arthur, Nov. 11.—A heavy snowstorm is prevailing on Lake Superior today. The steamer Orinoko from Cleveland with coal came into port this morning, having experienced bad weather all the way up. From Whitefish Point she kept to the north shore. When near Silver Islet, Captain Alinaworth discovered a vessel, which had wrecked on the rocks. The water was rolling over it. Owing to the heavy sea it was impossible to get near the vessel.

SNOW IN WINNIPEG.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 11.—The first real snow of the season set in this morning and is still in progress.

CLOSURE AGREED TO.

British Education Bill Will Be Passed by Nov. 25.

London, Nov. 11.—Premier Balfour's motion to apply automatic closure by departments to the government Education Bill, was agreed to in the House of Commons today by 222 votes to 130.

PRINTERS' STRIKE SETTLED.

Committee Arranges Difficultly With the T. Eaton Company.

The strike of the printers employed by the T. Eaton Co., Limited, has been satisfactorily arranged between a committee representing Typographical Union No. 91 and the management of the big departmental store. The strike was inaugurated over six months ago, and the announcement of an agreement was hailed with delight by both the printers and the interested firm.

OFFSET TO THE PREFERENCE IS NEWFOUNDLAND TREATY

Provides Against the Proposed Imposition of Differential Duties on U. S. Goods.

Washington, Nov. 11.—An important feature of the reciprocity treaty just negotiated with Newfoundland is a safeguard against the differential, in favor of all goods entering Newfoundland from England or any of the British colonies.

SWALLOWED HER WATCH.

Theatrical Woman Gulped It Down While She Was Asleep.

Quincy, Ill., Nov. 11.—Maude Lillian Bert, leading woman of the "Sultan of Zulu" company was taken ill during the Saturday night performance, being attacked with severe pain in the abdominal region. On Sunday evening she was placed under the X-rays and it was discovered that a silver watch had been swallowed in her hand.

ALFONSO SEEKS SAGASTA.

Gives Him a Free Hand to Reconstruct Cabinet.

Madrid, Nov. 11.—King Alfonso has entrusted Prime Minister Sagasta with the re-organization of the cabinet, and gives him a free hand in the matter. It is believed that Gen. Wevler will be retained in the War Office. Senor Sagasta is endeavoring to embody in the new cabinet a more democratic element than that which was found in the previous cabinet.

MONEY IN A MATTRESS.

Chatham, Nov. 11.—Miss Janet McKerrall, an aged spinster of Chatham Township, died, and her household effects were found \$800 in gold.

RETIRES IN A WEEK.

Ottawa, Nov. 11.—Sir Henry Strang's retirement from the Supreme Court takes effect on the 18th inst. He will be succeeded by Sir Elizer Tascherneau, and the vacancy in the court will be filled by the promotion of Mr. Justice Armour.

THE METROPOLITAN BANK.

The Metropolitan Bank will open for business on Monday morning next, Nov. 17. The general manager, Mr. Baillie, has for his first Mr. Connelley of the Ontario Bank, as his acting manager and accountant; H. B. Dunlop, secretary of the Imperial Bank, as his secretary, and Messrs. Warren and Foster as juniors.

FIRE AT WILTON.

Wilton, Nov. 11.—Fire broke out at 2 o'clock this morning in J. Heuter's new residence on Berford-street. The house had just been completed, and was not yet occupied. Loss about \$500; covered by insurance.

NO LIVES LOST.

New York, Nov. 11.—After a careful inspection of the new East River bridge, which suffered from fire last night, the contractors place the loss at not more than \$15,000. All of the men supposed to have been lost have been accounted for.

ESCAPED FROM HIS GLARIS.

Kingston, Nov. 11.—William Cleator, a member of the I. O. O. F., serving a term in jail for desertion, escaped from his Glaris to-day and is still at large.

DIED PLAYING CHESS.

Minneapolis, Nov. 11.—Lester R. Brooks, a millionaire grain and lumber dealer, dropped dead this evening while playing a chess game with his physician, Dr. Lester W. Day, at the West Hotel. He was afflicted with scintilla.
