This is what aroused the indignation of the college faculty, since this division of young men had already given evidence of their peaceful character.

Substance of the Testimony.

In substance, the sworn testimony of the boys and the faculty members was that six mounted officers charged the front end of their line, pushing their horses upon the sidewalk and striking the students right and left with their rawhide whips; that the charge was made without warning, the students hearing the word, "Disperse!" followed without the cavalry force halting by a charge right among the mass of students; this, too, when not a word had been spoken to the police, no stones thrown, nothing done to provoke the assault, other than the singing of college songs. The boys swore that they were cut and slashed with whips, knocked down by horses, and forced to jump over the fences, and run around houses to avoid being crushed by the horses of the officers. Many of them purped into the lawn of the Conservatory of Music, from which they were chased by a mounted man, who ran his horse in to the grounds; and, as the oays ran out.

Sergeant's Horse Cut.

On the contrary, Sergt. Goulding's horse, which he rode against the students, received a gash three inches long in the breast, from some source in the fight, and the officer testified that he did not cause the boys to be seattcred until he himself was hit with a stone. He would not swear that the boys were not hit with whips, but admitted that the men rode their bress onto the sidewalks, and drove the boys in every direction. The stone was thrown before the charge started, and, the officer swore, even before he had time to say a word. Then, he says, he called: "Go home quietly; don't make a disturbance; disperse."

The officer would not swear the students threw the stone, and, later, some gravel, but he is sure the stone came from the direction of the boys.
