Rev. Mr. Henry of Knox Church Says Barrooms Are Open on Sundays in Hamilton.

PRIZES GIVEN FOR BEST KEPT LAWNS

Important and Interesting Civic Function Commemorative of Lovable Efforts.

Hamilton, Sept. 29.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the temperance unions of Wentworth and Halton Counties this evening in Erskine Church, Rev. E. A. Henry, pastor of Knox Church, charged that the license act in reference to Saturday and Sunday night closing of the bar rooms was openly violated in this city, and that the enforcement was spasmodic.

At this afternoon's meeting Mrs. Leland Allen, Toronto, Dominion representative of the White Shield department, delivered an address on the subject of the license act.

At the second day of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, Mrs. H. A. Stevens read her address and said that the measures taken during the past year had nearly resulted in the passing of the anti-liquor bill thru the House of Commons.

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FEDERATION IN JUNCTION DIRECT TO BE DISSOLVED

Argument is Concluded—Provincials Claim Right in Granting Incorporation to Trinity.

A full presentation of the case of the opposing factions for and against the federation plans of Trinity University was heard yesterday before Justice MacMahon in the application made by the anti to continue the injunction they obtained to restrain the Trinity corporation from formally ratifying the federation agreement.

Frank Arnold, K.C., handled the argument for the anti-federationists; E. D. Armour, K.C., and Mr. Gwynne, for the B.C.s; and Mr. Ritchie, K.C., and J. A. Worrell for the federationists.

Chas. Ritchie, K.C., in reply, contended that it had been done since about midnight. The back and legs were badly burned, and the doctors think he was electrocuted. Beside him was found a pair of steel shears, with which a live year thief had stolen \$100,000, and sold it for about \$80. This morning the caretaker of the park thought he would get ahead of thieves, and turned off the current to cut the wires down himself.

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SALARIES OF JUDGES.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell Puts in Good Word for Mr. Ewart.

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—(Special.)—The question of judges' salaries provoked a long discussion in the Senate to-day. Senator Sullivan said that in no English speaking country are judicial salaries as low as in Canada.

Senator Miller declared that the majority of judges were sufficiently paid. Sir Mackenzie Bowell thought that the judges had been raised in the world since they were first appointed to the bench.

Senator Cloran described Mr. Ewart's remarks as a masterpiece of effrontery. He repeated Sir Mackenzie's words, and Mr. Ewart's address, thus placing it on the records of the Senate.
