Serious Situation

Boers Decline Secretary Chamberlain's Proposal

For a Joint Commission of Inquiry.

Large Proportions Assumed by Anglo-Canadian Trade.

Revolution Follows Famine in the Russian Province of Bessarabia.

Capt. Dreyfus Physically in a Bad Way—Vessel Sunk by a British Battleship.

London, Aug. 9.—Dispatches from Pretoria, capital of the South African republic, say the volksraad has declined to agree to the suggestion of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, British secretary of state for the colonies, that the effect which the Transvaal franchise reforms will have on the Uitlanders should be inquired into by a joint commission. The volksraad, however, consents to receive friendly suggestions.

The Daily Mail publishes the following dispatch from Johannesburg: "By a special article added to the groundwet (the constitution of the Transvaal), the president is authorized, in the event of war, rebellion, or other emergency, to proclaim martial law, and to compel every inhabitant of the republic to bear arms in its defense. The Pretoria forts are being strengthened and Boer agents are buying up all the available draught oxen in Bechuanaland." All the dispatches from the South African correspondents of the London morning papers take it for granted that the secret session of the volksraad will confirm the rejection of Mr. Chamberlain's proposal, but leave the way open to continue negotiations. They also dwell upon the serious situation thus arising, and upon the consternation of the Uitlanders over the addition to the groundwet compelling them to fight for the Transvaal, which would indicate that the Transvaal Government is expecting hostilities. The Times correspondent at Pretoria says: "A gloomy view is taken here of the whole situation. The general impression in Boer circles is that the Boers are engaged on a war, and that consequently it would be futile to make advances."

BRITISH-CANADIAN TRADE.

The imports from Canada in July reached the following amounts: 16,833 cattle, valued at \$237,614; 8,614 sheep and lambs valued at \$13,283; 453,537 cwt of bacon, valued at \$2,839,150; 19,540 cwt of hams, valued at \$241,332; 34,424 cwt of butter, valued at \$146,965; 234,915 cwt of cheese, valued at \$436,065; eggs, valued at \$714, and \$34 Royal said that the total imports reached the value of \$2,705,195, while the exports aggregated \$458,609.

FAMINE AND REVOLUTION.

The Vienna Neue Freie Presse says the peasantry of portions of Bessarabia (a government of Russia) have revolted, being driven desperate by famine. It is added, however, that no serious trouble has been taken place. A score of peasants have already been killed, and many have been wounded.

MR. CHOATE CALLED DOWN.

Regarding Mr. Choate's comments on Sir Wilfrid Laurier's recent speech in parliament, the Canadian high commissioner, Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, said to a press representative: "Sir Wilfrid Laurier's remark was merely a figure of speech, and not a political dodge, as intimated by Mr. Choate. Sir Wilfrid Laurier could not descend to such a thing, nor did he in any way mean to challenge the United States. No sensible man could regard war as possible, but Canada is simply taking a leaf out of the United States' book in demanding now what the United States demanded in the Venezuela case. Canada is now a nation, though closely allied to Great Britain. As such, she must protect her rights. We merely ask for an equitable settlement through arbitration, following the United States' lead. We believe, President McKinley is thoroughly in earnest in his endeavor to have the question honestly settled."

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THEY'RE OFF.

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 9.—About one hundred members of the Canadian Press Association left the Union Station yesterday on the special excursion to the coast. The special consisted of four sleepers and a baggage car. Several of the members were accompanied by their wives. On reaching Gravenhurst the party will stop off for a trip on Lake Simcoe.

BATTLE IN THE PHILIPPINES

MacArthur's Forces Defeated Six Thousand Insurgents.

Enemy Left Many Dead and Wounded on the Field.

War To Be Pushed to a Finish—Secretary Root Has Taken Hold in Earnest.

Manila, Aug. 9.—12:35 p.m.—Gen. MacArthur's force, consisting of 4,000 men, advanced five miles beyond San Fernando today, and encountered and defeated a Filipino force of 6,000 men. The enemy retreated, leaving many dead and wounded. The American loss in killed and wounded was twenty.

WAR TO BE PUSHED.

Plattsburg, N. Y., Aug. 9.—The war in the Philippines is to be prosecuted with a vigor that ought to result in speedy cessation of hostilities there. The correspondent of the Associated Press saw Secretary of War Root last night just after he had said good-bye to the president and was preparing to take the 9:45 train for Washington.

"Will the war in the Philippines be prosecuted vigorously from now on?" asked the Associated Press correspondent.

Mr. Root turned on his heel and replied quickly as a flash: "Yes, sir; the war in the Philippines from now on will be prosecuted with all possible energy. All the men, all the arms and all the supplies necessary to end the trouble in the islands will be furnished at the earliest possible moment."

"How large a force will be at the disposal of the commanding general there?" was asked.

"There will be 50,000 men there ready for active service at the close of the rainy season, about the last of October, and more will be sent there if necessary."

As to the rumor published in some of the papers that President McKinley and he were not agreeable upon the policy to be pursued in the Philippines, Mr. Root said:

"Of course, that is all nonsense."

When asked whether Gen. Otis would be relieved of the command of the American forces in the Philippines, Mr. Root replied that he had nothing to say on that point at this time. Secretary Root seldom talks for publication, and the fact that he has just come from a two days' conference with President McKinley adds interest to his words.

SUSPECTED OF ROBBERY

Ex-Clerk of Molsons Bank, Winnipeg, Arrested—\$50,000 of Stolen Money Recovered.

Winnipeg, Aug. 9.—John W. Anderson, aged 24 years, an ex-clerk of the Molsons Bank here, was arrested here yesterday, on suspicion

About \$50,000 of the stolen money, which had been hidden, was recovered today.

The detectives are after alleged accomplices.

DETAILS OF THE DISCOVERY.

Winnipeg, Aug. 9.—The mystery of the robbery of \$52,000 from Molsons Bank here between Sept. 23 and Oct. 4 last has been solved, and John W. Anderson, former junior clerk in the bank, is now in jail charged with the crime. The money has been recovered, and is now in safe custody.

Last March a dapper little chap named Davis drifted into town, and secured employment as clerk at a leading drygoods store. He took up lodgings at the same place where Anderson boarded, and the two became intimate friends. This intimacy led to the discovery of Anderson's crime.

Davis, through his friendship, succeeded in working admissions from Anderson, and finally locating the cashed money near the city shadowing Anderson on one of his pilgrimages to see that the money was safe.

The money, which comprised \$42,000 in non-negotiable or traceable bills, and \$20,000 in bills of ordinary circulation, was in a valise, buried some depth in the ground, and was recovered Monday afternoon.

The money has not been counted, but is supposed to be intact.

Anderson was taken into custody yesterday afternoon, after a warrant had been sworn out by Davis.

The reward of \$10,000 offered by the bank for the recovery of the money and apprehension of the prisoner will go to Davis, who is a Canadian from Thessalon, Ont.

Anderson came to Manitoba from Hastings, Ont., and is heir to a large sum of money left by his father, who was a prominent banker. He is about 22 years of age. A short time ago he left the bank and entered the employ of the McClary Manufacturing Company.

ATROCIOUS CRIME

Report of Marquis Romano on the Lynching of Five Italians.

Washington, Aug. 9.—The state department has received from the Italian authorities a copy of the report made by the Marquis Romano, secretary of the Italian embassy, on his investigation of the lynching of five Italians in Louisiana. The report presents the affair in a serious light, and shows that the Italian authorities view the occurrence as one of unusual atrocity. It contends that there were no mitigating circumstances; that Dr. Hodges fired a weapon, and that the first shot fired by Dufatta was in defense of his fallen brother and not a wanton attack. Describing the affair in detail, the report points out that some time after the first two men were lynched the mob made a second and then a third visit to the jail, whence they removed and lynched the other three Italians, all of whom, it is contended, were in utter ignorance of the wounding of Dr. Hodges. Conceding some of the circumstances in the lynching of the two men, Marquis Romano contends that the lynching of the other three was a thing of particular atrocity.

SUDDEN DEATH OF REV. DR. LAMSON.

St. Johnsbury, Vt., Aug. 9.—Rev. Chas. H. Lamson, D.D., of Hartford, Conn., president of the Canadian board of commissioners of foreign missions, died here suddenly, of neuritis of the heart. He was 56 years of age.
