Boers Decline Secretary Cham- tled. The misinterpretation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's remarks by the berlain's Proposal

For a Joint Commission of Inquiry.

Large Proportions Assumed by Anglo-Canadian Trade.

Revolution Follows Famine in the Russian Province of Bessarabia.

Capt. Dreyfus Physically in a Bad Way-Vessel Sunk by a British Battleship.

London, Aug. 9 .- Dispatches from Pretoria, capital of the South African republic, say the volksraad has declined to agree to the suggestion of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, British secretary of state for the colonies, that the effect which the Transvaal franchise reforms will have on the Uitlanders should be inquired into by a joint commission. The volksraad, however, con-

sents to receive friendly suggestions. The Daily Mail publishes the following dispatch from Johannesburg: By a special article added to the grondwet (the constitution of the Transvaal), the president is authorized, in the event of war, rebellion, or other emergency, to proclaim martial law, and to compel every inhabitant of the republic to bear arms in its de-fense. The Pretoria forts are being strengthened and Boer agents are buying up all the available draught oxen in Bechuanaland." All the dispatch-es from the South African correspondents of the London morning papers take it for granted that the secret session of the volksraad will confirm the rejection of Mr. Chamberlain's proposal, but leave the way open to continue negotiations. They also dwell upon the serious situation thus arising, and upon the consternation of the Uitlanders over the addition to the grondwet compelling them to fight for the Transvaal, which seem to indicate that the Transvaal Government is expecting hostilities. The Times correspondent at Pretoria says: "A gloomy view is taken here of the whole situation. The general impression in Boer circles is that Mr. Chamberlain is foreing on a war, and that consequently it would be futile to make advances.'

BRITISH-CANADIAN TRADE. The imports from Canada in Jul, reached the following amounts: 16,-858 cattle, valued at £287,614; 8,614 sheep and lambs valued at £13,283; 453,537 cwt of bacon, valued at \$40,495; 19,540 cwt of hams, valued at \$41,382; 34,424 owt of butter, valued at £146,-965; 234,915 owt of cheese, valued at £496.065; eggs, valued at £714, and 834 horses, valued at £22,566. The total imports reached the value of £2,705,while the exports aggregated £458,609.

FAMINE AND REVOLUTION The Vienna Neue Freie Press says the peasantry of portions of Bessarabia (a government of Russia) have revolted, being driven desperate by famine. Troops, it is added, have been sent there, and several encounters have taken place. A score of peasants have already been killed, and many have been wounded.

MOTOR WAGONS ARE ALL RIGHT. Last week the Self-Propelled Traffic Association had an elaborate series of public tests at Liverpool of motor wagons. Six different types of Englishmade wagons competed, carrying loads of from two to three and a half tons with smooth iron tires, which the gov-ernment bylaws prescribe as an element of safety. On the steepest gradient, one in nine, the motors stopped half-way to test their power of restarting in the middle of the hill, and take the 9:45 train for Washington. five out of six succeeded, the wagon built by the Thornycrofts, builders of the Shamrock, achieving the feat with the least apparent trouble. PARLIAMENT

Significant Reference Made to the "Unrest" in the Transvaal,

London, Aug. 9 .- Parliament was prorogued at 2 o'clock this afternoon by royal commission. The House of Lords met and summoned the Commons to the bar. The proceedings terminated

"My Lords and Gentlemen:

"My relations with the other powers continue friendly. The conference summoned by the Emperor of Russia to consider measures for promoting the maintenance of peace has completed its sittings. Although the result of its deliberations did not fully correspond with the lofty aim which it was summoned to accomplish, it has met with a considerable measure of success. The institution of a permanent tribunal of arbitration cannot fail to diminish the frequency of war, while the extension of the Geneva convention, will mitigate

its horrors." After a reference to the conclusion of the Anglo-French convention on the subject of the Nile Valley and the Anglo-Russian convention in regard to the railway enterprises in

China, the special continued: "We have received a petition from a considerable number of my subjects residing in the South African republic praying my assistance to obtain a removal of grievances and disabilities of which they complain. The position of my subjects in the South African republic is inconsistent with the promises of equal treatment, whereupon my grant of international independence to that republic was founded, and the unrest caused thereby is a constant source of danger to the peace and prosperity of my dominions in South Africa. Negotiations on this subject with the Government of the South African republic have been entered into and are still pro-

ATROCIOUS CRIME

Report of Marquis Romano on the

Lynching of Five Italians. Washington, Aug. 9.-The state department has received from the Italian authorities a copy of the report made by the Marquis Romano, secretary of the Italian embassy, on his investigation of the lynching of five Italians in Louisiana. The report presents the affair in a serious light, and shows that the Italian authorities view the occurrence as one of unusual atrocity. It contends that there were no mitigating circumstness; that Dr. Hodges first drew a weapon, and that the first shot fired by Defatta was in defense of his fallen brother and not a wanton at-tack.
