FINE WEATHER.

Toronto, Sept. 12—11 p.m.—There is decided change in the distribution of pressure since yesterday. It continues high over the lakes, and has increased somewhat in Eastern Canada. Low pressure still obtains over Alberta and Assiniboia, and is extending to Manitoba. The weather is fine everywhere; warmer in the Northwest, and with stationary or a little higher temperature from the lakes to Alberta. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 64-68; Kamloops, 56-76; Barkerville, 49-76; Calgary, 41-72; Battleford, 49-74; Winnipeg, 49-72; Port Arthur, 44-62; Parry Sound, 44-66; Toronto, 44-64; Ottawa, 47-62; Montreal, 42-56; Quebec, 38-54; Halifax, 46-66. Probabilities: Toronto, Sept. 13—1 a.m.—Lower, lakes. Fresh, easterly winds; fair, stationary or a little higher temperature. Local temperatures: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Monday were 72 and 59 degrees.

—Stratford Herald: Bishop O'Connor, of London, confirmed 11 candidates at St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church, Logan, in Rev. Father Downey's parish, recently. Rev. Dr. Kilroy was present and officiated at high mass. The bishop preached twice during the day, and the evening proceeded to Mitchell and confirmed five candidates. Mitchell is also in Father Downey's parish.

—Harvest thanksgiving services were held on Sunday at All Saints' Mission Chapel, Hamilton road. The chapel was beautifully decorated with flowers, and the congregation was large. Rev. J. W. Ten Eyck, assistant rector of the Memorial parish, presided at the 11 o'clock service and administered Holy Communion. In the afternoon Rev. J. H. Moorhouse, rector of Christ Church, gave an interesting and helpful address to the school children. Rev. T. H. Brown, incumbent at Delaware, preached at the evening service.

CALL DECLINED.
Rev. E. H. Sowers, of Westminster, has declined the call to Walkerton.

AN AUDIENCE CAPTIVATED.
Last evening the rooms of the Bell piano warehouses were crowded, hundreds being unable to get in. The sidewalk in front was blocked also during the progress of the entertainment provided by the famous orchestral pianist, Mr. T. W. Eckert. The songs rendered by this celebrated musician were loudly encored, while his performances on the piano, with imitations of orchestra instruments, established a reputation at once that Mr. Eckert is a wonder.

The finance committee of the city council held a special meeting last night to discuss the question of switching privileges of the Lake Erie and Detroit River (Railroad), which had been referred to the council by the Port Stanley Railway board.

Mr. J. W. Coburn, solicitor of the L. E. and D. R. R., presented his side of the case. He said the trouble began last April, when the G. T. R. asked his company that the free switching privileges would be discontinued, and that \$2 per car would be charged. The notice was unheeded, and the climax was reached in July, when the G. T. R. refused to continue switching privileges until the back money for switching had been paid, and giving notice that the rates for ordinary freight would be raised to \$2 per car and \$5 for Wabash. The L. E. and D. R. R. contended that the price they claimed had always been charged by the road, and were transferred to this company when the twenty years' lease was made. They did not ask for special privileges, but merely that such merchandise as coal should be switched to the yards along the G. T. R. free of charge. The G. T. R. had expressed a willingness to arbitrate the matter, but his company did not feel inclined to shoulder the expense. He thought, however, that they should contribute a reasonable amount of the expense. They were opening up a new industry by bringing coal across the lakes, and every ton brought in now was carried at a loss to the L. E. and D. R. R. on account of paying for switching. The people of London wanted all the outside freight connection they could get—most of all, cheap coal. The average per year on a basis of \$2 per car would be about \$1,000, but this might easily increase to \$4,000 or \$5,000. The city was interested just as much as the L. E. and D. R. R. for if these privileges were taken away, the road, in addition to the switching charges of the lease, would be less valuable. He thought the city should join them in bringing the matter to a focus.

The mayor asked what the result would be if the L. E. and D. R. R. contested the case and it went against them.

Mr. Coburn said that in that event they would be justified, he thought, in deducting the switching charges from the \$10,000 rental. He did not think the company should contest it. They looked to the lessors of the road for protection in these particulars.

Mr. Meredith contended that all of the agreement between the Port Stanley board, the city and the L. E. and D. R. R. had not been fulfilled. He fully understood the matter from a citizen's standpoint. They wanted all the freight connection they could get, and coal as cheap as possible. He showed that by the city going into litigation with the L. E. and D. R. R. and against the G. T. R., they placed themselves in an awkward position. If the city consented to the use of its name and the case went against the L. E. and D. R. R. it would place the latter company in a position to claim that, by the fact of being a joint party in the action, they had practically said that the L. E. and D. R. R. were right in their contention that these privileges properly belonged to the city, and had been handed over to the lease of the road was made, and that the L. E. and D. R. R. might proceed to deduct the cost of switching from the rental. He suggested that the matter be left to arbitration, the Port Stanley board to choose one arbitrator, the L. E. and D. R. R. a second and the two a third—their decision to be final.

Mr. Coburn said his company would be bound by the finding of the arbitrators, and if the matter were decided against them the city would be in no way liable.

No definite action was taken on the matter, but before the council meets, Mr. Coburn will consult with his company as to what form the proceedings shall take.

The telegram from Mayor Owens, of the New Westminister, was referred to the council for action thereon. The members present were Ald. Winnett (chairman), Mayor Wilson, Ald. Graham, O'Meara, McPhillips and Secretary Pope.

New Dancing Academy.

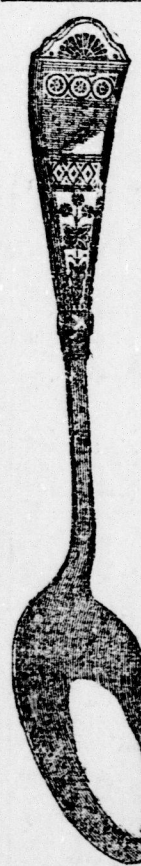
