The Switching Difficulty Between the G. T. R. and L. E. and D. R. R.

The Lake Erie and Detroit Solicitor Presents His Side of the Case-City Solicitor Meredith Replies.

The finance committee of the city council held a special meeting last night to discuss the question of switching privileges of the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railroad, which had been referred to the council by the Port Stanley Railway board. Mr. J. W. Coburn, solicitor of the L

E. and D. R. R., presented his side of the case. He said the trouble began last April, when the G. T. R. notified his company that the free switching privileges would be discontinued, and that \$2 per car would be charged. The notice was unheeded, and the climax was reached in July, when the G. T. R. refused to continue switching privileges until the back money for switching had been paid, and giving notice that the rates for ordinary freight would be raised to \$3 per car and \$5 for Wabash. The L.E. and D. R. R. contended that the privileges they claimed had always been enjoyed by the road, and were transferred to this company. and administered Holy Communion. In red to this company when the twenty years' lease was made. They did no rector of Christ Church, gave an interesting and helpful address to the school children. Rev. T. H. They looked to the lessors of the road Mr. Meredith contended that all of the agreement between the Port Stanley board, the city and the L. E. and D. R. R. had not been fulfilled. He fully understood the matter from a citizen's standpoint. They wanted all the freight connection they could get, and coal as cheap as possible. He showed that by the city going into litigation with the L. E. and D. R. R. and against the G. T. R., they placed themselves in an arrivaged party of the state of the s themselves in an awkward position. If the city consented to the use of its name and the case went against the L. E. and D. R. R. it would place the latter company in a position to claim that, by the fact of being a joint party in the action, they had practically said that the L. E. and D. R. R. were right in their contentions, that these privileges properly belonged to the city, and had been handed over when the lease of the road was made, and that the L. E. and D. R. Co. might proceed to deduct the cost of switching from the rental. He suggested that the matter be left to arbitration, the Port Stanley board to choose one arbitrator, the L. E. and D. R. R. a second and the two a third-their decision to be final.

Mr. Coburn said his company would be bound by the finding of the arbitrators, and if the matter were decided against them the city would be No definite action was taken on the

Mr. Coburn will consult with his company as to what form the proceedings shall take.
