INGERSOLL ENTHUSED.

INGERSOLL, May 10.—The question of greater production during 1917 has INGERSOLL, May 10.—The question of greater production during 1917 has been taken up here in a most enthusiastic manner, following the addresses at the meeting of the council by Messrs. Martin and Kelly, president and vice-president, respectively, of the Hamilton Board of Trade.

Committees from the council, "3,000 Club" and citizens generally have been appointed to go into the matter thoroughly. A canvass has been made of the different wards for the purpose of ascertaining the number of vacant lots and the degree of co-operation that can be expected in putting into effect the scheme as proposed by the organization of resources committee. Definite arrangements will shortly be made. It is expected that all the potatoes required for seed will be brought here and sold at about \$4\$ per bag. It also is probable that if such action is justified by the demands for land that part of Victoria Park will be broken up. It has been estimated that about 15,000 bags of potatoes would be necessary to meet the demand in Ingersoil for one year, and it is hoped to produce them this year in much larger quantities than formerly.

TURN CATTLE OUT. TURN CATTLE OUT.

ILDERTON, May 10.—Pasture for stock is late and very few farmers have turned any out, but some, who were out of feed, were forced to turn their cattle out, although they will "go back" for some time. It is expected most of the export steers will go to pasture in a few days now and some grain or hay will be fed to keep up the stock.

Fall wheat has not done as well as Fall wheat has not done as well as expected owing to continued cold weather, but some fine fields on the dry or well-drained farms are noticed. Clover also has suffered owing to cold and frosts, but with good warm weather now will be an average crop.

Nearly all of the Lobo farmers have finished seeding and some of the early sown fields are showing green, especially the barley, which sprouts much sooner than oats. The weather has been cold for the season, but with fine sunny days now the spring crops will be all right yet as the land was in fine shape and the cultivating well done in most cases.

Little outside help was received with the seeding or needed, some farmers claiming that inexperienced help, such as the city could supply, would be of little use for seeding, but might come in useful at harvest time if available.


