A dressing table is a justifiable luxury, but in a room where every inch of space counts, a mirror-scraper with a not too sharp knife. Stand your soap on the wall, about twenty-seven inches from the floor, with a mirror above it. A glass shelf is, of course, the most satisfactory—it is so easily kept clean—but it is rather expensive. A white enamel shelf with a pretty dresser scarf makes a fresh, dainty-looking dressing table.

With the dressing table that comes out of the shops there is, of course, a little low-backed chair. It slides under the dressing table, yet its back does not stand up above the table-top. The more important reason for its low back, however, is that there is nothing to interfere with dressing the hair while seated. The ordinary chair is in the way of every movement of the brush, but it may be converted to convenience by sawing off the back even with top of that brace, leaving a back about eight inches high. A coat of paint and enamel will cover the sawed edges satisfactorily.

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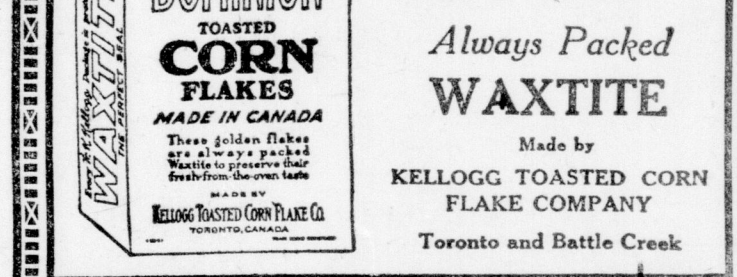

Woven Rag Rugs

Summer is here and with it the usual amount of fancy work for the porch; be it our own, or that of a hotel at seaside or mountain resort. At any rate it behooves us to find something both useful and interesting with which to occupy ourselves. For the person who stays at home it seems to be a good thing to do, as most every house has a need of one more rug and it is usually have plenty of friends who would welcome such a thing at their homes.

The rugs that I have especially in mind are the woven rag rugs, which are very pretty and much less trouble to make than the braided ones.

Like the braided rugs, they can be made of all cotton, or of wool, or of a mixture of both cotton and wool. First the rugs must be cut in strips, and the width of these strips depends on how heavy you want your rug to be. An inch strip makes a rather lightweight rug, while about three inches will make quite a heavy one. Judgment has to be used in deciding this, of course, for a heavy cloth must not be cut as wide as a thin cotton one, for they are heavier.

If you would like your rug to be a "hit and miss," then all different colored rags can be sewed together; but if you prefer a striped rug, then the colors should be made in separate balls, and the weaver makes the stripes according to the materials you are using. After the rags are all sewed and in balls, the only thing left to do is to send them to a weaver, or a factory.

To keep the balls of crocheted edge in a hurry? Then use a piece of seam binding about half an inch wide and to it crocheted edge just along one edge. The straight edge makes it easy to sew on a garment in a few minutes.

Don't forget that your crocheted hook makes an excellent substitute for a button, for running ribbons or tapes through a casing. The hook of the needle is caught firmly in the tape and the button end of the ribbons runs through the hole.

Instead of ribbon, make yourself lingerie cords by crocheting a length of chain, and by taking a thread in every other stitch of the chain, and sew through the hole.

Place in a saucepan and bring to a boil. Cook for five minutes. Place the rubbers and lids in position, partially fasten them, then place the jars in a hot water bath and process for thirty minutes after the boiling starts. Now remove, fasten the tops securely, invert to test for leaks, then label and store in a cool place.

Preserved Cherries—Stem and stone the cherries. Wash after stoning, allowing one-half pound of sugar to each pound of cherries. To each pound of sugar allow one-half cupful of water. Place in a saucepan and stir until well dissolved. Bring to a boil and cook for five minutes, then add two pounds of prepared cherries. Cook after the boiling point is reached for twelve minutes, then fill into glass jars. Place the rubber and top in position and seal partially tight; now place the jars in a hot water bath and process for ten minutes after the boiling starts. Finish with balls or crocheted motifs.

Cherry Jam.—Three-quarters pound sugar, one pound stemmed and stoned cherries. Place in a saucepan and cook until thick. Fill into jelly glasses; allow the jam to cool, and then cover the glasses with paraffin. Seal and store in the usual manner for jellies.

Cherry Jelly.—Cherries, one-half pound good jelly, owing to the absence of pectin. This pectin may be added in the form of apples. Peel one large lemon very thin, discarding the peel. Cut peeled lemon in small pieces. Cut a sufficient number of squares to small pieces to measure three cupfuls, then add: Three pounds cherries, one quart water. Place in a saucepan and cook until soft enough to mash; strain in the usual manner for jellies and measure the juice, allowing an equal measure of sugar. Return the juice to the preserving kettle and boil ten minutes. Then add the sugar. Cook until it jellies when tried on a cold saucer; usually about eight or nine minutes. If a thermometer is used, cook until 221 degrees Fahrenheit is reached.

To can cherries wash the fruit thoroughly, then drain well. Sort the fruit over carefully, removing all blemishes and all soft cherries. Remove the stems and stones. Pack them into sterilized jars and cover with boiling water or a syrup made of sugar and water, using the formula: One cupful sugar, two and one-half cupfuls water.
